STEPMOTHER IS UNDER CHARGE

For Murder of Infant Which Medical Testimony Says was Kicked to Death—She Disappeared Before Crime was Known—Police Searching for Guilty Woman.

MONTREAL, July 19.—(Special)—The coroner's jury which investigated the death of the two-and-a-half year old child of John Dobuck, Point St Charles, has a verdict of murder and the step-mother is accused of the crime.

The medical testimony was to the effect that the child had been kicked to death. The step mother who disappeared before the crime was discovered is still at liberty, although the police have been looking for her for a couple of days.

SCOTLAND ASKS A PARLIAMENT

To Deal With Scottish Local Matters—Her Representatives Grown Weary of Delays and Jealous of Liberal Treatment Promised Ireland, Frame a Bill

LONDON, July 19.—(Special)—Irritated by the lack of opportunities to discuss Scottish questions in the House of Commons and somewhat jealous of the promises of greater control of local affairs made to Ireland in the King's speech at the opening of Parliament, the Scottish members have selected Mr. Perle, liberal

member for the North Division of Aberdeen to introduce a bill providing for the establishment of a Parliament for Scotland. The bill, the text of which was issued today, provides for the creation of a single chamber Legislature to deal with purely Scottish legislation.

O'MEARA'S ANSWER TO HIS CRITICS

BOSTON, July 18.—In a statement in which he says a commissioner who allows himself to be influenced by partisan prejudices is a hypocrite personally and a perjurer under the terms of oath of office, Police Commissioner O'Meara stoutly defends the appointment of Leo A. Rogers, a Democrat, as his private secretary at a salary of \$3000 a year. O'Meara's comment is in answer to some Jamaica Plain Republicans who wanted a member of their own party selected.

St. JOHN, July 19.—(Special)—The breach of promise action brought by Miss Ethel Grace Gibbon aged 25 against George Rowley, aged 34 in which a verdict for defendant was found at the last sitting of the circuit court, will be appealed. Miss Gibbon is not satisfied with the verdict and for various reasons has decided to carry an appeal to the Supreme Court of the Province, which will meet in Fredericton in October.

THE RUSSIAN CRISIS ACUTE

The Duma Issues a Proclamation on the Land Question—Hope of Reconciliation Now Abandoned—Austria and Germany May Send Troops to Aid the Czar

St. PETERSBURG, July 19.—(Special)—The belief that the adoption by the Lower House of Parliament today of a proclamation to the nation on the agrarian question will precipitate long brewing conflict and plunge the country into civil war is profound. All hope of a reconciliation between Parliament and Government is vanishing and the Government is preparing to take up the gauge of battle when it is formally thrown down.

At the council held at Peterof last night Camarilla came out strongly in favor of dissolving Parliament, but according to the best information the Emperor hesitated. Austria and Germany, according to official Russia, have agreed in the principle of sending troops across the border to aid in the suppression of an agrarian uprising should the Russian Government formally request it. Russia's announcement created a tremendous sensation.

SYDNEY FIREMEN COMING HERE

SYDNEY, July 19.—The firemen are meeting with success in raising a fund to pay the expenses of their men to the Charlottetown Firemen's Carnival. It is estimated that it will cost \$400 to send the men, about 20, to the Island. The firemen have \$100 on hand, and expect to get another \$100 from their friends among the citizens, and look to the Town Council for \$300. As far as can be learned from the expression of individual opinion of Mayor and councillors the firemen's request will meet with ready response from the council. Last year the firemen asked the council for \$100, but finding that they had enough funds on hand for all purposes did not collect it. In that year they raised about \$550 to pay for their uniforms and paid all expenses of attending the carnival at Sydney. The mayor has expressed the opinion that the town should have asked the firemen to attend the carnival to give them an opportunity to see what other towns are doing and so to become more proficient. As the firemen have expressed their desire to go he considers that the least the town can do is to give them the \$300. There is little doubt but that the mayor's sentiments are shared by all the councillors. The firemen are putting in plenty of practice and will have strong teams. They will enter in all the events.

KING'S ADVISERS WERE ADVERSE

MONTREAL, July 18.—Canada's disappointment at the King's inability to accept her invitation is shared by very many Englishmen. These who know how court affairs of this kind are treated refuse to believe that Earl Grey would have allowed the invitation to be adopted by the Canadian parliament had the King not himself wished to visit Canada, if the obvious official obstacles could be removed. The inevitable inference is that officialdom there is mostly responsible for the present refusal. Some suggest that the ministers—proposed when the King first announced his visit to the Kaiser as highly desirable in view of the dangerous possibilities of the situation in the near east to which Foreign Secretary Grey made such emphatic reference in parliament the other day.
