ILL-ADVISED

Our attention has been directed to a circular letter issued over the name "The Summerside Fox Exchange Company, Limited," which we are informed has recently been freely distributed among prospective investors.

One of the statements made is that the parents of this batch of imported foxes "have such fur that our island foxes must feel ashamed of their coats". Another, as misleading as it is uncalled for, is that "Prince Edward Island pure stock is degenerating," and hence the Summerside Fox Exchange Company, Limited, "would be glad to have your order for a few pairs" of the "high class" foxes which they have imported.

Those who have made a study of the fox breeding industry, who have watched its marvellous growth in the past few years and who know that it was the superiority of Island bred stock that attracted the present world-wide interest in the business will be surprised that a Prince Edward Island firm should have such assurance as to seek to build up a business on statements that are so contrary to known facts.

It is to be regretted that, at a time when the world is becoming interested in our fox industry, when the term "Class A. Prince Edward Island foxes" is being advertised and relied upon as representing the world's best in foxdom, such statements should be allowed to go forth from the hon: of the fox industry. Probably the circular has been issued without the authority of the directors, some of whose names are to be found on prospectuses of Island pedigreed fox companies containing assertions diametrically opposed to the contents of the circular.

Few who know anything about the fox business will be misled by such representations as those referred to as the public have learned to regard with suspicion and distrust any proposition seeking to acquire advantage by "advertisement's artful aid" of the description referred to.

SIR JAMES WHITNEY ON THE ELECTION

Sir James Whitney expressed his opinion regarding the provincial elections when he gave out the following statement:—

"Again the people of Ontario have placed my colleagues and myself under a tremendous load of obligations to them. What we have done has been justified and, indeed, as is well known, there was hardly any criticism of our record by our opponents. This would, under ordinary circumstances, leave very little to be said besides welcoming the unmistakable endorsement we have now received from an appreciative public for the fourth time.

cold blooded and dishonest attempt was made to make use of the so-called temperance question to get unfair advantage of us and throw us out of power and put Mr. Rowell in office. In order to carry out this plan a few demagogic clergymen, anxious above all else for the success of this party move, were not ashamed, and did not hesitate to denounce us and every good citizen who approved of our course as had citizens and worse and to announce their views and denunciations from their pulpits in im-temperate, violent and abusive language, which I will not further describe but which in some cases was calculated to make a listener shudder. However, the result has shown several things; among others, that these men have no influence whatever and that the good people of Ontario regard them with quiet contempt. What injury they may have done to the temperance idea, and what is of more consequence—what injury they may have inflicted on the influence of the churches will be seen more clearly as time goes on.

"At this point I desire to express my high appreciation of the manner in which the great majority of the clergymen of the province bore themselves during the conflict in the face of the efforts made to embroil them in it.

TROUBLED MEXICO

According to our latest telegrams the mediators at Niagara Falls have succeeded in making arrangements for a solution of the international part of the Mexican problem but the internal troubles in that country seem as far from settlement as at any time since President Diaz was deposed and compelled to leave the country. The Huerta Government, which is not recognized by the United States, is stated to be ready and anxious for peace on honorable terms but its enemies are holding back. The rebels, or Constitutionalists as they call themselves, have won a decisive victory at Zacatecas and have designs on the capital. Encouraged by recent successes they are confident of capturing the Government by military strength. Because of this confidence they are in no hurry to hand their case over to the mediators at Niagara Falls. If they drive Huerta from power they will be in a position to make their own terms, being indebted to no outsiders. The threat that the United States may withhold recognition of the government they may establish if they capture Mexico City seemingly has no terror for them any more than it has had for Huerta. Possibly the rebels believe that as they have had the moral support at least of Washington, and, as it is alleged, practical support from some United States citizens, they will not be very strongly opposed by the northern republic in any event.

Conditions in Mexico today must be very bad. If the situation were not well-nigh desperate the British minister, Sir Lionel Carden, would hardly publicly advise all the subjects of Great Britain residing there to depart. His warning indicates that events may develop that will make it unsafe for foreigners to be in the country. President Huerta, it appears may have his power so weakened that he will be unable to extend protection to foreign residents. Little faith seems to be put in the promises of the rebel leaders that they will respect the lives and property of the subjects of other countries whose business keeps them in Mexico. The records of some of the chiefs are so unsavory that there is no doubt as to their good intentions for the future. Indeed, the leaders are fighting among themselves, Carranza and Villa, the two most prominent, are on the verge of separating, if they have not already done so. Kech has his personal followers and if the breach between the two widens peace will be far off. To the Mexicans who are tired of the disastrous turmoil and uncertainty the situation must be most discouraging. There seems to be no hope that normal conditions will be restored for some time. There is not in sight a man to win general recognition and support. Before the dictator's time there were hundreds of revolutions, mostly small ones it is true, but all serious. Some were so bad that foreign nations had to intervene. The attempt to establish an empire resulted in the execution of Maximilian, the brother of Francis Joseph of Austria, who is once more bereaved. Since Diaz's departure there has been rebellion after rebellion and the end is not in sight. It will take more than the good offices of representa-

tives of other American republics to make Mexico a civilized and law-abiding state of the modern type. The Mexicans will have to reform themselves.

EGG CIRCLES

Sir,—I noticed in your issue of June 25th, a very interesting account of an Egg Circle meeting held at Murray River, on Saturday, June 21th, and as the island Representative of the Poultry Division of the Live Stock Branch of the Federal Department of Agriculture, I feel it my duty to make clear a few points.

The Federal Department of Agriculture is making strong efforts to bring about an improvement in the quality of the eggs and poultry being placed on our markets and the Department recognizes that the producers must receive encouragement if this matter is to be worked out successfully. The Egg Circle movement is receiving the support of my Department and other means are being employed to work out this matter of improvement for the benefit of both producer and consumer.

The Department has been and is strongly urging the buyers in all parts of the Dominion to buy eggs on a quality basis with a view to benefiting producers, buyers, and consumers. The Egg Circle movement makes this system soundly practical. It gives the producer more profit due to the elimination of wastefulness, removes the formerly existing difficulties which stood in the way of dealers buying eggs on a quality basis, and if all will co-operate all will benefit, and we shall be able to give the consumers better quality eggs at lower prices than they have formerly been compelled to pay. It should be quite clearly understood, however, that the policy of my Department is to take no part in the actual marketing of produce.

The statement that the Department is supporting the movement to rent a warehouse in Montreal must have been made through some misunderstanding.

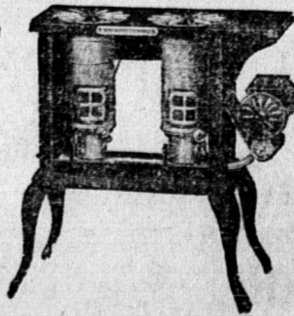
