The S. S. Rosalind sailed yesterday morning at eleven o'clock for Newfoundland, having arrived in port eight hours previous. She had two passengers outward, Mrs. Jones and Mrs. Morrow of Souris, to St. John's. Her outward cargo consisted of seven hundred bags of oats, eighty cases blubberies, seven hundred bags potatoes, twenty-five barrels apples, ninety barrels vegetables, fifty-six cases eggs, fifty head cattle, and sundry other cargo.

A large barn belonging to Wm. Nelson, French Fort, was struck by lightning and burned to the ground on Tuesday afternoon together with a large part of the season's crop and a number of farm implements, threshing gear, etc. Herbert Nelson, his son, was badly burned in endeavoring to save the machinery.
