Major F. J. Ney Gives outstanding Address on war

The High School Auditorium, Summerside, was filled to capacity on Wednesday for the address by Major F. J. Ney, M.C., F.R.G.S., L.L.D.

Major Ney in his introductory remarks before he gave his illustrated address, spoke of the splendid work done by the National Council of Education, which is rendering a very real service to Canada.

Both now and after the war the League can render valuable service. He stressed the need of all Canadians to realize the difficult days which are ahead. No one ever doubted that we would win the war, but we cannot win the war on the spiritual front, we cannot win it at all. We have to win the peace and must prepare for it now.

The pictures dealt with Britain's war effort. The pictures, complete stories in themselves, of the different phases of war work were a revelation to the audience. Britain's might and of her ability and will-power to carry on under great difficulties. They also gave evidence of the strong support given her by her colonies. They also depicted the vast territory which England has to guard. The splendid work of the London police, the women of England, the navy, army and air force. Each had a separate story showing the special duties of each. Their courage and devotion to duty is worthy of the highest tribute from every one of the world over.

Major Ney during the course of the evening told some touching stories from personal experience which gave the audience a peep into the hearts and minds of the British people.

Miss Mary Hunt, Regent of the Abegweit Chapter of the I. O. O. F. moved a vote of thanks to Major Ney for his very wonderful address. Rev. G. R. Harrison seconded the motion. Supporting it were Senator Creelman, MacArthur, Premier Campbell, Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan.

Miss Sue Meadows was the pianist. The meeting opened with O Canada and closed with the King. Members of the clergy, O. D. E. and School Board and teachers met Major Ney after the lecture for a consultation on the Educational League.

CASE OF DIPHTHERIA DISCOVERED. One case of diphtheria—in the Provincial Infirmary—has been discovered in the province. Dr. B. C. Keeping, Deputy Minister of Public Health, announced last night at a City Board of Health meeting. A case of spinal meningitis in the city was reported to him yesterday—the first this month. There was also a report of a case of scarlet fever reported from Chapeau and he had heard of several cases of whooping cough in the city although none of the latter had been officially brought to his notice. On the whole however, the general health of citizens is good, he announced.

BOARD OF HEALTH MEETING. At a meeting of the Board of Health held last night in Council Chambers resolutions were passed concerning an "unfit for habitation" of several houses in the City and ordering that they be made fit for habitation or demolished at the option of the owner before the 13th day of December and that proper notice be given to the occupant. The houses named were: 84 Gerald Street, 72 Upper Queen and 19 Cumberland. His Worship, Mayor Holman presided and Dr. B. C. Keeping, Health Officer, was in attendance.

TOTAL WAR EFFORT DISCUSSED. Preliminary steps were taken in connection with starting a campaign in the province towards placing before the people the contents of the report presented by the Canadian Legion to Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Oct. 21, as to the necessity of Canada taking the steps for a total war effort—selective conscription of man power and also total resources—which in the opinion of the Legion is necessary if Canada is to play her full part in the war. At a meeting of the Provincial Executive Council of the Canadian Legion, President, R. L. Molison, Summerside, presided and considerable other business was transacted. The meeting was held in the Legion building, Charlottetown.

GOOD AYRESHIRE PRICES. Mr. Earl Ings of Mount Herbert, Director of the Canadian Ayreshire Breeders Association has just received some cheering news from the secretary of the organization on the effect of the war on breeders in the old country. The information sent by Mr. Ings concerned the annual bull and heifer sale by A. W. Montgomery at Cambuslang, Scotland. At this sale 52 head, 30 bulls and 22 females sold at an average of \$1,210 each. The highest priced bull went for \$8,477 and the highest priced female for \$2,653. Mr. Ings said he considered it good news for breeders on this side of the Atlantic. If men so close to the scene of hostilities considered the future of their industry so secure they were willing to pay out such sums for high class breeding stock it should be an example for farmers here.




Revival Campaign
