KRUPPS FAMILY PAY BIG WAR TAXES

BERLIN, May 23.—It is officially announced that the joint contributions of the Krupp family and firm at Essen to the \$250,000,000 "war tax" assessed in Germany is 2,151,750.

Baroness Bertha Krupp von Bohlen and her husband will pay \$1,725,000, the Krupp Company \$211,750, and Frau Krupp, the "Cannon Queen's" widowed mother, \$215,000.

Among them the Krupps will pay 7 per cent of the entire contribution of the city of Essen.

It is announced that the German government has rejected the protest lodged by Russia, France, Belgium and Holland in regard to the taxing of their nationals resident in Germany, on the ground that the tax is not a "war tax," in violation of commercial treaties, but merely a "contribution."

Preaching at Ninety-five

The Rev. Robert Church, of Peterborough, who is the oldest Nonconformist minister in the country, has celebrated his ninety-fifth birthday. He has been in receipt of a pension from the Primitive Methodist Connection for about thirteen years, but he still preaches on the Peterborough circuit.

Roman Grave in Cheeshire

While excavating work in connection with a new infirmary at Chester was being carried out the grave of a Roman lady was revealed, which Professor Newstead estimated to be 1,700 years old. It contains the skeleton with a coin inserted in the mouth, a mirror, sandals, and fragments of Roman pottery and glass.

Value of a Rat-catcher's Dog

A Birmingham rat-catcher, who obtained \$100 damages at the Birmingham County Court from the corporation for the loss of his dog which was killed by a motor ambulance, said the animal was worth \$200 to him. It earned for him from \$10 to \$12 a week by catching rats. "To lose such a dog," he said, "is like losing my right arm."

Rat Plague at Kingston

Protests have been made to the medical officer of health for Kingston-on-Thames with regard to the number of rats on a piece of land in Lower Marsh lane, used by the corporation as a dust heap. More than 1,000 rats have been caught alive, and numbers are killed daily.

Ten-year-Old Pickpocket

An extraordinary case of juvenile pickpocketing was dealt with at Clydebank Police Court, a girl of ten years of age being charged with four different thefts of purses with money from women who were making purchases at various shops. The fiscal said the girl was nothing short of being an expert pickpocket. The first purse she stole she placed on the tramway rails in order, when a car passed over it, that all trace of it would be destroyed. It was proposed to send the girl to a reformatory.

Advantage of Weak Whiskey

At Kirkcaldy James Anderson, grocer, was fined \$40 for having sold a bottle of whiskey adulterated with water. Mr. Thomson, on behalf of the accused, said he got in a quantity of whiskey which he believed to be considerably over proof, and added water without testing. Mr. Thomson thought it was possibly to the advantage of those who got it, as it would do less harm.

Organization

The Bonanza Fox Breeding Company, Limited, is being formed for the purpose of breeding Silver Black Foxes, Minks and other fur-bearing animals in captivity with an authorized capital of \$150,000.00 divided into shares of \$100.00 each.

The organizers are all business men of good judgment and standing in social commercial and financial circles.

Of the above capital stock it is proposed to issue \$64,000.00 on the basis of \$16,000.00 a pair for four pairs of foxes. This includes a thoroughly equipped Ranch, completed ready to receive the foxes.

The Foxes

The Company has been fortunate in securing four options on 1914 pups from the silk of the Black Fox Blood of Prince Edward Island. They are in a position to procure two more pairs if it is found necessary to do so. The Directors have power to further increase that number if they deem it necessary and hope to have at least eight pairs of foxes in the ranch by Oct 1st.

The Ranch

It will be one of the most modern thoroughly equipped and efficiently managed in the Province; will be situated in a luxurious grove of wood; will be as perfect an imitation of the natural haunts of the fox as man can devise.

Ranch Management

The ranch will be under the direct care and supervision of William Keeping who was born in Newfoundland where he learned from nature all the cunning and traits of Mr. Reynard. He is perfectly familiar with their habits and conditions; nothing will be left undone to assure safety and success to the enterprise.

Veterinary Surgeon

A qualified veterinary specialist can be secured whenever his services may be required at a comparatively low fee.

Ranch Expenses

For the feeding, caring and suitably ranching the foxes, the keeper will receive a yearly salary of one thousand dollars and Five per cent of value of increase from what foxes are put in the ranch this year. The balance of increase, after paying Secretary's salary and other legitimate expenses, will be paid to stock holders pro ratio, according to their holdings. The agreement with the Rancher to run for five years from Sept. 1st. 1914.

Stability of the Fox Business

That the demand for furs of all kinds is increasing every year to an enormous extent we cannot deny. Also we know that many of the fur-bearing animals are becoming less and less every year. With these facts staring us in the face we are bound to believe that the fox business is good for many years yet at its present value, and when it comes down to a fur basis it will be among the gilt-edged investments of the day.

If all the fur pelts that are in P. E. I. to-day were put on the world's market, they would not last two hours.

P. E. Island Black Fox Home

The Buffalo and the Beaver are nearly all gone. The Sea Otter and Seal are becoming very scarce and now, of the really valuable fur-bearing animals, the Black Fox or Silver Fox is the only one that is bred in captivity, and Eighty-five per cent. of all these are in Prince Edward Island.

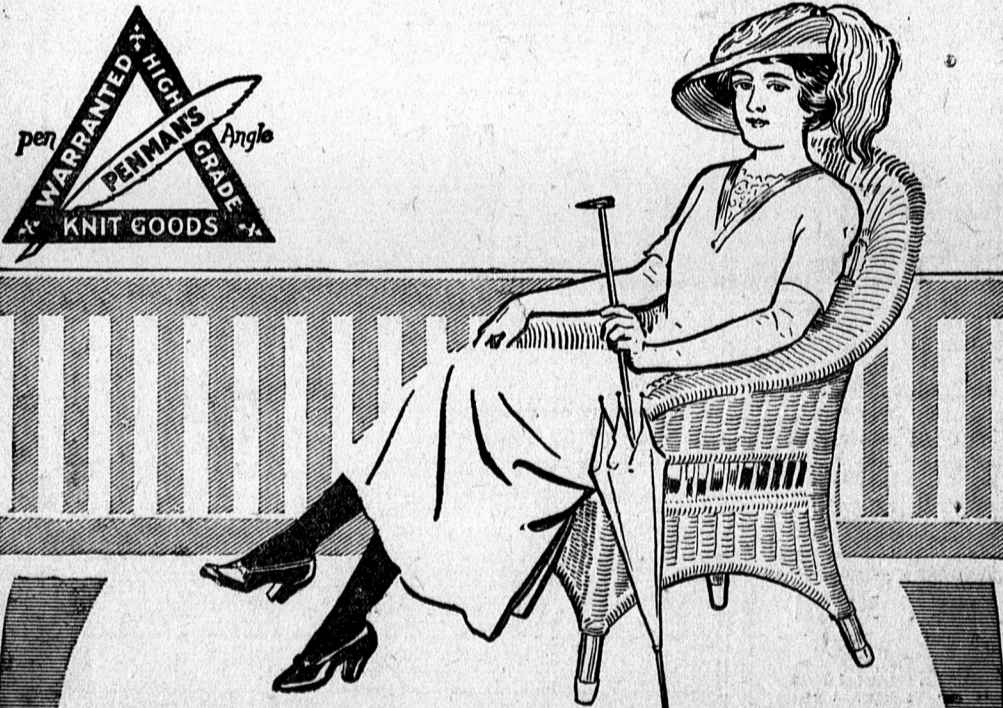
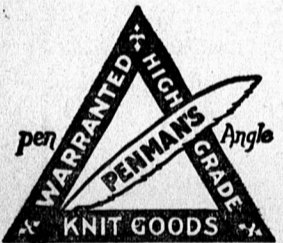
