A HOSPITAL MATTER.

Under the above caption the Summerville Journal takes note of complaints that are sometimes made that applications for admission are sometimes not acceded to, and friends of the P. E. Island Hospital do not understand why this is the case: The reason is that the applications made are on behalf of unfortunate patients who are incurable. It is most regrettable that these applications have to be declined, and the hospital surgeons share deeply in this regret. We ought to have a ward in which incurables could receive surgical and medical aid, but though other provinces have such wards or hospitals, wholly devoted to that worthy object, there is none such on the Island.

The P. E. Island Hospital exists for the benefit of supposed curable patients such as fever cases, the victims of accidents, or diseases requiring surgical treatment for a limited time. It would wholly divert the institution from the object for which it was created if the wards were permitted to be filled up with incurables to the exclusion of the classes of patients for whom it was designed.

These explanations seem necessary in view of the complaints sometimes made. As the Journal very truly remarks: "No distinction of rank, position, or wealth is made in the admission of sufferers. The hospital is a cosmopolitan institution, where rich and poor, high and low, Jew and Gentile, are unhesitatingly admitted, and given alike the best medical and surgical skill and the best nursing possible. And hundreds have been restored to health and strength by means of the great skill and care bestowed upon them by the kindly physicians and nurses of the Prince Edward Island Hospital. None apply in vain where there is the slightest possibility of affording them any relief." The limit of financial resources and room to accommodate patients alone make it necessary to decline to admit those who, in the judgment of the Hospital staff cannot be cured or materially helped by admission and treatment.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Ottawa boasts that 33 per cent of the families residing in the federal capital own their own homes. Surely that is not a thing to boast of. We venture that very few Canadians cities have more than 67 per cent of their people living in rented houses.

One great gain to the Manitoba farmers in the past two years has been that they are now well enough off to hold their crops for the best price the market will afford. In former years they were forced to sell at once when the crop was harvested for what it would bring.

In view of the prevalence of Anarchist plots it is not surprising that an attempt should be made upon the life of the German Emperor. The arrest of nine of the miscreants engaged in the plot at Alexandria is a most fortunate occurrence, but it by no means shows that the danger is over. It will require the greatest precautions to prevent his assassination during the long journey to Jerusalem and back again to Berlin.

Some important changes have been made in the staff of the Intercolonial Railway. The office of General Superintendent has been revived and Mr. James E. Price appointed thereto. He is well qualified by good abilities and long experience for the position. Mr. Jarvis, Train Despatcher, has been made superintendent of N. B. and N. S. divisions and other changes all in the way of deserved promotion have been made.

The London Times speaks out significantly in regard to the growth of ritualism in the Anglican church. In a recent issue it says: "If the advanced section of the clergy are allowed to run their present unchecked the nation will determine that if the church sanctions such teaching and practices it must be as an independent religious body not speaking in the name of the English people."

The Ontario legislature held a short session last summer and to save expense it was decided to make it a part of the next session. So the house was adjourned instead of being prorogued. Since then it has been discovered that there is a law providing that no election can be held except when the house has been prorogued. Several vacancies require to be filled and so a formal prorogation has been proclaimed in order that by-elections may take place. It would have been much better and saved some money if this contingency had been thought of in time.

Col. Waring, whose name is a household word in Charlottetown, is now in Cuba with a corps of expert engineers making investigations and surveys preparatory to improving the sanitary condition of Havana as soon as the city comes under American jurisdiction. His selection by the United States government for this important work is only another proof of his pre-eminence as the foremost sanitary engineer of the western world.

It is gratifying to note that the contract has been let in Scotland for the construction of the new winter steamer for service between the Island and the mainland. It is expected to be ready in September of next year and will be a decided improvement on the Stanley. Beyond question almost we owe this good prospect to the fact that the Island is now financially represented in a cabinet position by Sir Louis H. Davies. It is expected the new steamer will be called the Minto.

Simultaneously two pieces of news are placed on the newspaper pages. One tells of the movement in England to give Washington a monument there. The other piece of news comes from Toronto in the form of a protest from the Loyalist Society against the erection of a statue at Quebec for General Montgomery. Take your choice between these conflicting views, but reflect whether the feeling which makes such monuments possible is not simply the honest outgrowth of the Anglo-American element that is now in the air? We gave Montcalm a joint monument with Wolfe, though Montcalm was an enemy.
