MGR. BURKE PAYS TRIBUTE TO THE CANADIANS TROOP

Nov. 26—Monsignor Burke has returned to London after spending a week in Flanders as the guest of G. H. Q. He visited all the chaplains of his church on the battle-line and at the bases, and gives our correspondent the following impressions:

"It is a joy and pride to me as a Canadian, to hear Sir John French praise our boys with great heartiness. He told me he found them a superior lot of soldiers, and splendid fellows. General Alderson warmly supported this judgment.

"This enviable reputation our fellows are making every day, but strengthened by the latest smart thing done under Major Costigan, namely, the capture of a German trench, and the killing and taking prisoners of a superior number of the enemy. This incident not only serves to keep our men in England in better heart and spirits, but gives every available man in Canada with the desire to enroll himself for his country's necessity.

"Naturally at this season of the year, many hardships attach themselves to trench life in Flanders, but I hear from the Canadians in the war area. Their attitude is one of truly philosophic acceptance, without a shadow of doubt of the ultimate victory. They realize also, as every soldier must, that Canada is the world's today. When the war is over, nobody will refuse her the place she has made for herself."

JOHN REDMOND'S TRIBUTE

Monsignor Burke saw a good deal of John Redmond at the front. He says the invaluable work he is doing is greatly appreciated. His speech to the troops was most inspiring. There was no division among the Irish fighters, or any others, in welcoming the Irish chief, while shrilling in the air above him sounded the "compliments" of that Kaiser who once foolishly thought a rebel Ireland was his greatest asset.

Mr. Redmond's comment to Mgr. Burke upon the Canadians whom he saw was "Fine fellows, indeed."

Mgr. Burke saw the freshly dug graves of A. Walsh and A. Kelly, who had been buried that day. He found the Canadian base hospitals doing excellent work. He says that Col. MacLaren, of No. 1 hospital, now has a permanent main building with two wards, called the New Brunswick Building, supplied by the generosity of New Brunswickers.

HAVE ALL PRIESTS NEEDED

"Tell our people in Canada not to worry about their sons being without priests. We now have on the battle-line every man to whom we are entitled. No single soldier should be without his Canadian confessor in the hour of danger. The ladies of the Red Cross Society, at St. Peter's Bay, are still doing their good work for the soldiers. Their latest donation was a box of socks, containing 120 pairs, sent to the Field Comforts Commissioner, as a Christmas gift to the boys at the front. DEADLOCK BETWEEN OTTAWA LEADERS

Are Unable to Agree Upon Extension of Parliament.

OTTAWA, Nov. 27.—A deadlock has been reached in the negotiations between Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier in regard to the extension of Parliament. The next move will be discussed and settled by the full Cabinet meeting, which will be held next week.

The Government asked it is understood, for two things—first, for an extension of Parliament for the same terms as the British extension, which has been already agreed upon by the Imperial Cabinet, and second, in order to avoid all semblance of elections, that there be no contest in any of the seven seats now vacant.

Sir Wilfrid has not agreed to either of these proposals. The Opposition leader, it is understood, has finally agreed to an extension of Parliament for a year, but objects to agree to acclamation in three of the seats, but only in three.

The issue to which he will consent to acclamations are Prince, in Prince Edward Island, made vacant by the death of Mr. J. A. Richards; Restigouche, vacant through the death of Mr. James Reid, and Hamilton, through the death of Hon. Sam Barker. The first two are Liberal and the third Conservative.

There are four other vacancies, all Conservative, in which the Liberals want to reserve the right to a contest. They are Brandon and Ligar, where Sir James Aikens and Mr. W. H. Sharpe resigned to enter the Provincial field, and Carleton and King's Nova Scotia, where Mr. W. F. Garland and Mr. Arthur Dewitt Foster resigned owing to connection with war contracts.
