BOOMING ROOT FOR THE PRESIDENCY.
NEW YORK, April 8.—A movement for the nomination of Elihu Root for the presidency, launched last night by a statement bearing the signatures of seventy-four prominent republicans, is supported by Robert Bacon, former member of Colonel Roosevelt's cabinet, and one of his closest friends. In a statement published to-day, Mr Bacon says: "My first choice is Elihu Root, my second choice Theodore Roosevelt."
Mr Bacon last week was host at the luncheon which brought Col. Roosevelt and Mr Root together for the first time since the latter opposed Mr Roosevelt at the republican national convention in 1912.
William Barnes, republican national committeeman, many of whose adherents signed the Root statement, declared there was nothing behind it except desire to promote the nomination of Mr Root. He denied emphatically a report that the statement was a manoeuvre to help the candidacy of Colonel Roosevelt.

ANOTHER BRITISH SUCCESS IN EAST AFRICA.
LONDON, April 7.—Another success for the British in East Africa is reported by Lieutenant-General Jan C. Smuts, commander of the British expedition operating against the Germans, in the following despatch:—"As the result of a movement commenced on the afternoon of Monday mounted troops, under General Vandercor, successfully surprised a German force with machine guns stationed in a mountain stronghold in the Arusha region. This force was surrounded during the course of Tuesday and surrendered Thursday morning."

—ADDRESS AT KENSINGTON.—Lieutenant Methcalf gave an address in the Methodist Church in Kensington on Sunday night, on the war and conditions arising therefrom. He deprecated the tendency of the rank and file of the people to harbour a distrust in their minds of Government officials and people entrusted with patriotic funds. It is a "Labour of love" with those people, who are among the very best citizens, and whose integrity is above reproach, and to eliminate the possible suspicion of unfairness, a strict accounting is kept of all receipts and disbursements. Access can be had to the books of all custodians of goods or money collected for patriotic purposes. Lieut. Methcalf strongly deprecated the fact that many people are inclined to blame governments as a whole for acts of individual members. He spoke with withering sarcasm of the individual in a governing body, who is so selfish as to work for his own personal welfare, in this hour of the Empire's need, thereby jeopardizing the good name of the government of which he happens to be an individual, and shaking the confidence of the people in the administrations which are helping the Imperial Government to carry the war to a successful termination.—K.

BIG FRENCH STEAMSHIP'S CLOSE CALL.
MARSEILLES, France, April 9.—The large French passenger steamship Colbert was shelled without preliminary warning by a submarine in the Mediterranean, but, being under a full head of steam, she escaped her aggressor by superior speed, at the same time sending out wireless messages of the submarine's presence to other ships in the vicinity. The Colbert is 5,394 gross tons, 377 feet long and 47 feet beam, was built in 1908 at French Mediterranean shipyards.
