## METHODIST MISSIONARY COMMITTEE MEETS TO MAKE ALLOTMENTS

ST. JOHN, Oct. 19.—A meeting of the standing missionary committee of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island conference of the Methodist Church was held in the board room of Centenary church, this city, yesterday morning and afternoon.

The committee is composed of the following ministers and laymen: Revs. J. L. Dawson, Charlottetown, (P.E.I.), president of the conference; George Steel, D. D., superintendent of missions; Thomas Marshal, Fairville, and W. H. Barraclough, now of Moncton, and Col. F. S. Moore, Charlottetown; Dr. J. M. Palmer, Sackville; J. M. Lemont, Fredericton; J. A. Brace, Summerside; Mayor R. T. Hayes, and F. T. Barbour, St. John.

The president of the conference, Rev. J. L. Dawson, occupied the chair. The Rev. Dr. Fenwick and Arthur Mews, of St. John's (Nfld.), were also present and were given corresponding privileges.

The superintendent of missions reported having recently visited the Hampton mission and paid tribute to the good work being done by the Rev. J. F. Rowley and his recording steward, J. E. Angevine.

The grant made by the general board of missions to the conference this year amounts to \$12,350.

Mention was also made of a supplementary grant or "war bonus." A communication was read from the Rev. C. E. Manning, associate secretary of home missions, explaining that after the supplementary grant had been passed, it was discovered that there existed a deficiency in the appropriation to the department of foreign missions which would amount to practically the sum voted as a special grant to home missions. The general secretary urgently requested the standing missionary committee to voluntarily surrender the amount of the supplementary grant, as made to this conference, in order to relieve the general board of missions of an embarrassing situation.

After considerable discussion it was moved, seconded and resolved: That this standing missionary committee of the N. B. and P. E. I. conference agrees to relinquish its claim to the supplementary grant, when the general secretary of missions certifies that a majority of the conferences have agreed to do the same.

The grants to the various missions were then considered and the following appropriations made: Springfield, \$445; Hampton, \$230; St. Martins, \$160; Jerusalem, \$30, and a special grant of \$300 to assist in building a new parsonage; Welsford, \$300; Long Reach, \$500; Gibson, \$200; Stanley, \$320; Boiestown, \$170 and \$200 extra in the event of an additional man being employed; Keswick, \$175; Sheffield, \$440; Grand Lake, \$355; Gagetown, \$360 Oromocto, \$310; Canterbury, \$270; Andover, \$475; Argyle,

\$35; Tabusintac, \$150; Buctouche, \$425; Harcourt, \$310; Bonaventure, \$50; Gaspe and Cape Ozo, \$300, and an additional \$100 if a second man is employed, which amount is left on the hands of the superintendent of missions; Shediac, \$500; Dorchester, \$600; Albert, \$450; Alma, \$550; Hillsboro, \$230; Petitcodiac, \$185; Elgin, \$325; Tantramar, \$75; St. Andrews, \$445; Oak Bay, \$425; Bocabec, \$200; Deer Island \$30; Montague, (P.E.I.), \$315; Souris, (P.E.I.), \$430; and Biddeford, (P. E. I.), \$185.

The superintendent of missions, Dr. Steel, was requested to negotiate with the superintendent officers of other denominations with a view to a wider co-operation between the churches.

On motion it was resolved: That every mission upon which a married man is stationed be required to raise at least \$400 for minister's salary and \$100 for horse keep, before being eligible for a grant, and that no grant be made for more than \$500 to any mission.

A communication came from Rev. Jabez S. Rice concerning the missionary summer school held for the past three years at Freetown (P.E.I.). On motion the committee expressed its appreciation of the splendid work done by the Freetown summer school and its willingness to co-operate with the committees appointed by the Charlottetown and Summerside districts in their plans for the continuation of summer school work.

The committee adjourned to meet again in March, 1918.

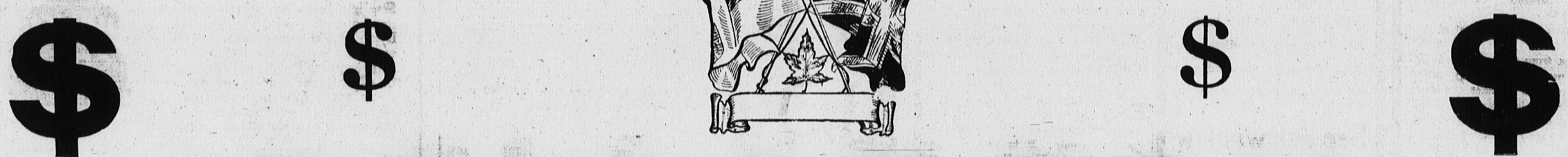
