HIGHLAND BRIGADE POPULAR. A Halifax exchange says, Nova Scotia came down a peg in the recruiting in the Maritime Provinces last week. For a long time Nova Scotia has headed the three Provinces in the weekly returns from the office here of the Chief Recruiting Officer for the Maritime Provinces. Nova Scotia has generally led New Brunswick by a good margin. Last week, however, the sister Province came out on top. The totals for the week ending Saturday, Feb. 5th, are: New Brunswick, 265; Nova Scotia, 220; and Prince Edward Island 22. It is stated that the reason for the comparative slackness in recruiting in Nova Scotia is that many men are waiting for announcement of the authorization of the Highland Brigade, the idea of being in a "Kiltie" Regiment has a particular appeal to many, so that they are holding back until recruiting commences for the Brigade. SEED FAIR.—Seed fairs are now beginning to attract considerable attention among the farmers. The first one will be held at Murray River on Thursday next in connection with the Short Course. The seed fair at Souris, which was formerly held annually in the season, will be one of the last. It will be held while a short course is in progress at Souris. The exact date is not yet known.
