## CANADA FOR THE PEOPLE

MONTREAL, March 29.—Professor John Cox, the director of the Physics Building at McGill University, gave an address on "Canada for the Canadians" at the weekly luncheon of the Canadian Club of Montreal the other day. There was a large attendance. The lecturer said he would put aside the absurd aspect of "Canada for the Canadians," which was the ballot cry of a stupid local patriotism, saying whatever tariff Canada might put upon manufacturers, "for heaven's sake don't put a tariff on brains, for if you do you will not even secure a monopoly. Canada needs the best, and it would be very poor patriotism to be put off with anything secondary merely on the ground of locality or birth."

The sense in which he wished to plead for "Canada for the Canadians" was in the conservation of the country's natural resources. First there were the forests, which ought to be strictly conserved and protected. He had heard a party who followed a trail through the forest, and put out several smouldering camp fires which would inevitably have set the forest afire. At last the party caught up those who had left the fires, and found they were a couple of fire rangers! Things like this showed that there ought to be other qualifications for appointment besides political ones.

Then water rights ought never to be granted in perpetuity. They should only be granted on condition of immediate development and for a definite period only. Several years ago one of the greatest water powers in the province was given away to a company largely using foreign capital for some \$60,000,000. Yet the water power might have been made to pay for the education of the whole province.

Coal was another thing prodigally wasted—60 per cent in getting it out of the mines with all possible speed, and much more in using it when it was got out. The lands of the country were one of its greatest assets, yet every possible means were being taken to bring out hordes of immigrants many of whom were the scum of Europe, and placing them on the lands of the North-West.

Surely, he said, you cannot be so much in love with modern civilization as to wish to multiply its worst aspects all over the earth. Surely we ought to do more leisurely and develop our lands along better lines.

He thought the battle to be rich was at the bottom of many of the present evils, resulting in the resources of the country being held up so as to enable few men to make big fortunes, while the mass of the people remained poor. The evils were largely due to the usurpation of other functions by commercial men. Money interests had got hold of the theatres, of music, and of newspapers, which were applied to the purpose of making money. Thus the wells of public opinion were poisoned at their source—and even the universities were feeling the grip of commerce.

He was, however, an optimist, and he believed he could see signs that the idea of accumulation of riches beyond the dreams of avarice was being played out. They must not underrate the genius of captains of industry or Napoleons of commerce, but they must have the genius directed to other ends than mere money making. Already there were such men who were beginning to recognize that it was desirable to share the results of their genius rather than had hitherto, to be the case.

"I believe public opinion is undergoing an evolution," added Professor Cox, "that ultimately may result in our giving Christianity a trial. We call ourselves Christian, but nobody can say we have put Christianity into practise, for our international relations are openly barbarous; our commercial life is thinly disguised warfare, stripped of the things which lend picturesqueness to the real article; and our high financing strikes an outsider as a kind of gamble in which, by means of inside information, you may take the other fellow's money."

## INDIANS, PROBLEM IN STATE OF MAINE

BANGOR, Me., March 28.—The remnants of the once great tribes of Maine Indians are in a certain sense proving a white elephant on the hands of the Pine Tree State.

There are three tribes, the Abenakis, Passamaquoddy and Penobscot Indians, and under the terms of an agreement made at the time Maine became a State, the State is bound to look out for the material welfare of the descendants of the red men, for it is hard to characterize the present generation as simon pure Indians because through intermarriage with the whites there is not now a full blooded Indian living of the eight hundred who composed the membership of the three tribes.

There was talk of introducing at the present session of the Legislature a measure authorizing the sale of the land comprised in the Indian Reservations of the State and adding the proceeds to the funds already held in trust for the tribes with a view to turning the Indians loose to look out for themselves, but it was discovered that under existing agreements the State is bound to support them, whether they work or play, so it does not seem there will be any legislative attempt at this session to make them self-supporting.

The abodes of the tribes are in the eastern section of the State, where comfortable dwellings erected at the expense of the State, shelter the families and where subsistence is provided by the State. The lands are as good as there are in Maine for agricultural purposes, but the Indians show no disposition to follow farming or to perform any other productive labor.

Outside of the allowance they receive from the State the chief source of income especially among the Penobscots, is derived from fishing and trapping along the streams in undeveloped sections and the sale of Indian articles to Summer visitors.

During the War of the Revolution the Maine Indians remained friendly to the colonies and aided materially in the fight for independence. Their support was assumed by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts after the independence of the colonies had become a fact, and when Maine was set apart from the mother State an express agreement was made binding the new State to assume this obligation in perpetuity.



## QUANTITY OF DOGFISH TREATED

OTTAWA, March 29—Replying to Mr. Borden, in the house of commons the government to-day made a return as to the dogfish reduction plants in operation. The quantity of dogfish treated at Canso during the past four years was 528 tons; at Shippegan 981 tons. In 1907-8 there was realized for product (fish scrap and oil) \$15,976. This did not equal the cost of operations. No figures are given as to the plant at Clark's Harbor, except the cost of construction, \$36,062, and the cost of operation for 1908-9 amount to \$681.
