CHILDREN Continued from page 1 into two groups, the first group consisting of the children up to Grade 6, and the second group of the children from Grade 6 to Grade 10. There will be a first and second prize offered in each group. The essays are to be finished and handed in by the last day of school previous to the Easter Holidays. Canon Malone then told his audience something of the Migration of Birds, explaining what was meant by it. He told them of the yearly migration of the birds from Europe to Africa and back again. Formerly, during the glacial age, they had done this to escape the ice and snow, and get food. But now it was a matter of habit. And a strange thing was that the young birds start south before the old ones. Thus, migration has become a racial instinct. So strong is this urge to migrate that birds kept in cages will injure themselves against the bars, even if they are quite tame, in their effort to take part in the flight. A good place to observe these migrations from was a light house, though many birds dash themselves against the glass, and are injured or killed. Very often too, they come to rest on vessels at sea, being tired with their long flight. Terns, in their migrations, fly 11,000 miles, and curlews and sandpipers fly nearly as far. Swallows also fly all the way from Europe to Africa. Storks fly at the height of 4,200 feet, and at the rate of 48 miles per hour. Swifts, however, fly as high as 6,000 feet and at the rate of 65 miles per hour. But as a rule, birds do not fly much more than a couple of hundred feet from the surface of the earth. Rev. A. J. MacIntyre said that one of the reasons why we were asked to be kind to animals was, that, if we were kind to animals we would also be kind and just to one another. Another reason is, that boys and girls have a sense of honour; they do not wish to see anything that savours of unfairness and, it is unfair to hurt an animal which cannot protect itself. Rev. Father MacIntyre said a good word for the sparrows—friendly little chaps as they are, and the only ones which stay with us all the year round. Never destroy a bird's nest; never hurt a poor wandering animal. They will return kindness in gratitude.

Death of Sir James Aikins WINNIPEG, Mar. 1.-Sir James Aikins, K.C., former Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba, and distinguished member of the Canadian bar died late last night. (Sir James Albert Manning Aikins K. B. M. A., K. C., was born in 1851 in Grahamsville, Ont. He was formerly conservative federal member for Brandon, later leader of the Provincial party in Manitoba, and in 1916 appointed Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba holding the office for two terms. He was a distinguished lawyer, and president and founder of the Canadian Bar Association, and headed the movement for the visit of the Canadian and American bars to Europe in 1924. He was one of the outstanding public men of Canada.)
