## ANOTHER AD RACE.

The Guardian has been requested by Dr. R. John Ledwell, and by W. F. Boggs, the engineer in charge of the construction of the new railway buildings and by R. H. Sterns, proprietor of the Hotel Victoria in this City, to state that these gentlemen will give respectively a valuable cup and two gold medals to the men coming in first second and third in a road race to be contested on Saturday the 22nd inst., that is, two weeks from tomorrow.

The course is to be a measured seven miles on the St. Peter's road and the finish will be in front of the Guardian office, Grafton Street. There was a very widespread desire, manifested without reserve at the conclusion of the race last night, so ably managed by our contemporary, to see the same men engage in another contest, under better conditions, and to have the course all road, eliminating the bridge, the planking of which favors track performers it is alleged more than road racers.

The cup is to be lifted and kept by the winner as soon as the race is concluded, and the same applies to the medals and any other prizes. There will be other prizes about which further particulars will be given later on. The event of eight entries filling by the same men as raced yesterday will qualify for the race. The desire is to see what the result of a seven miles contest under the conditions outlined above will be if the same men who started yesterday start on the 22nd. Entries are requested to be made at The Guardian office by Monday next the 10th inst.

**PROBLEMS OF TODAY**  
In New York last Sunday in the West Side Y.M.C.A. some of the serious problems of today were discussed by Prof. Guthrie, of the College of the City of New York, and Alexander F. Irvine, author of "My Life in Peonage," discussed. In opening the discussion Prof. Guthrie after discussing the economic problems which confront us, said that we must not go too far in establishing rules and regulations for a remedy, maintaining that one great cause of the progress of the country has been the lack of rules and regulation to bind us. Mr. Irvine dwelt most specifically upon

the religious aspect of the question. He declared that under the system of the present day it is absolutely impossible for democracy—as represented among the poor of the Protestant denominations—to share in the work of the Church. "Why don't the poor especially the Protestant section of the poor, have a function in the Church?" he asked. "Because nowadays to go to church in the Protestant churches is a question of clothes. "Before a private gathering I heard Bishop Potter speak with indignation of a \$2,000 gown which was worn to church by a woman. That gown was made after the cruel work of tearing a number of young animals from their mother. Why this cruel process and why the expense of this gown? Because it was unique for the reason that nobody else then had it." He then asked whether the poor will go to church under such conditions. "No, the poor will not do it, and if I were a working man, I would not permit my wife to do it," shouted the speaker, and there came immediately vigorous applause from nearly every man in the hall. In closing Mr. Irvine said: "I believe that for a man to be a pastor and speak the truth—the whole truth—is impossible."
