

progress was reported and permission granted to sit again. House adjourned till 8 o'clock.

EVENING SESSION, MAY 7.

House met at 9.

Hon. A. E. Arsenault said he had asked the Premier last night for supply. So far he had seen nothing of it, nor did he see any notice on the order paper. There was such a thing as driving a willing horse to death; also there was the possibility of the horse balking.

Hon. J. H. Bell said it was his present intention to bring down the budget early in the week.

Hon. A. Arsenault asked if it was the intention to pass the taxation measure before bringing down the budget.

Hon. J. H. Bell said it was his hope and desire to speed the work. It was possible that the budget would be brought down before the taxation bill was completed.

Hon. A. E. Arsenault said it was not the intention of this side of the House to let the bill go through without knowing what the estimates were.

The taxation measure was resumed in committee with Mr. A. E. McLean in the chair.



of every person (other than persons assessors under Part III), the assessor shall allow as deduction from the gross income of each person all exemptions allowed by section 7 and all expenses incurred by that person in the production of the income, except the following:

(1) The domestic or private personal expenses of the taxpayer and his family, including rent of house, occupied by him or them.

(2) Income derived from any source without the Province, if such income is brought into or used within the Province.

(3) Any liabilities incurred by the taxpayer, any paid out of income in any year, where such liabilities were not actually incurred in producing the income of that year.

(4) Any interest on capital.

(5) Any interest on borrowed moneys from which an income is derived.

(6) Expenditure of a capital nature or which in the opinion of the Provincial Treasurer is of a capital nature.

(7) Any income transferred from

later than the first day of September in each year, furnish the assessor with a correct list of the officers and employers of such person whose respective annual income so far as he has any knowledge of, exceeds five hundred dollars, and on the said list he shall state the amount paid by him to each such officer or employee for the year ending the thirty-first day of December, preceding the date of such demand.

Clause 48 provides that the assessor may, omit, from the assessment roll, the recorded name of any taxpayer or the property of own or occupy, if the assessor has reason to believe that the claimant is not entitled to be placed upon the roll or to be assessed for such property.

Hon. A. E. Arsenault and Mr. J. D. Stewart objected strongly to this clause as giving the assessor too much power.

The clause was allowed to stand. House adjourned at 10.40 till Monday at 3 p. m.
