An increase in the tax rate of .10 per cent, amounting to 10 cents on every \$100, taxes, would pay for the school over a period of years, the Mayor said. He was erroneously reported yesterday as stating he would be willing to have taxes doubled in order to assist in the erection of the school.

MORRELL CO-OP. ASSOCIATION LTD — President Jerome O'Brien reported on behalf of the directors that in May, Mr. Dennis and Mr. Crockett requested a joint meeting of Directors of all Co-operatives for the purpose of setting up a central book-keeping system with an office in the store. This project was carried out. The office was built. Modern office equipment was installed and an efficient office staff was hired. This idea has worked splendidly and has saved the individual co-operatives the profit level is somewhat lower this year due to the fact that the store, faced with rising prices, has tried to keep prices down as long as it possibly can. We feel that prices are going too high and by lowering our profit level it will help a little in the battle against inflation. This spring the store has tried very hard to market all potatoes offered by members whether seed or table stock. We think that the store has done a pretty good job. The egg business has increased over last year. We have been grading, stamping, and sizing all season for the overseas market. This year there are two projects to be considered. (1) The installing of a feed mixing plant which at present is held up by a lack of power and the scarcity of concentrates. We think that by mixing our own feeds we could give lower prices which would offset the increased feed prices and (2) keep our farmers in production. The possibility of installing a power grinder for potatoes. Farmers and fishermen on business basis. Why not set up just what profit is in a definite branch of farming or fishing. You hear farmers saying there is no money in hogs or poultry; why not keep a record of costs and find out?

WELLINGTON, N.Z., May 15 — (Reuters) — A "swosser" has been hatched out in Central Bay, east coast province of New Zealand. The swosser is a cross between a swan and a goose. It is sterile and invariably short-lived. This one, the only chick to be hatched of a clutch of six eggs, is several weeks old.
