**Canadiens Blast Bruins; Win Stanley Cup**

**Three Goals In Final Period Paves Way For Montreal's 6-3 Victory**

 MONTREAL, April 9—(CP)—Skating at the torrid pace they set all winter, Montreal Canadiens put on a third period three-goal splurge against Boston Bruins tonight to pull out a 6-3 victory and capture the Stanley Cup, emblematic of world hockey supremacy, four games to one in the best-of-seven series.

Both teams staged furious hockey in the first two periods but in the last frame the Boston defence broke down under the pressure, paving the way for Canadiens' scoring spree.

After taking the National Hockey League championship during three consecutive seasons, the smooth-working Canadiens captured their second Stanley Cup in the same number of years. They waltzed through the semi-final series in easy fashion to beat Chicago Black Hawks in four straight games and then took four games from Bruins while dropping only one to take the cup.

Montreal's Bill Durnan and Boston's Frankie Brimsek who staged a terrific goal tending duel throughout the entire series, again turned in outstanding exhibition work defended tonight. Brimsek deserved no part of the Boston defence which was mainly the cause of Montreal's lead in the first and second periods. Canadiens came from behind twice before taking the lead. They emerged from the initial period on top of a 3-2 count but Bruins tied up the count in a mid-session which featured spectacular goal tending at both ends of the ice. Canadiens went wild in the last period to score the three goals that provided the margin of victory.

**Individual Stars**

Aside from the goalies, the individual stars of the game were Elmer Lach who paced the Montreal victory with a goal and two assists, Kenny Reardon who played steady hockey at the Montreal blue line all evening long and Bobby Bauer who notched one goal for Bruins and played his heart out throughout the game, skating both ways at a terrific pace.

Bill Cowley broke the scoring ice after 34 minutes of play when he fired a low backhander behind Durnan to take advantage of a penalty to Montreal's Dutch Bouchard.

Bobby Filion evened up the count when he sank a goalmouth pass from Nels Miller. Bruins came surging back and Bobby Bauer lifted them into a 2-1 lead when he picked a rebound off the stick of Forke Dumart and fired the puck into the unprotected corner of the net. Canadiens' close checking prevailed in the second period and Milt Schmidt tallied the only goal, a lightning shot which never left the ice and

At full strength for the best-of-seven series which opens in Maple Leaf Gardens Saturday night, the 15 hockey hopefuls were in top condition and at what coach Walter Monson considered to be their "peak form."

In the attacking division the wide Maple Leaf Gardens' ice surface is expected to be handy to such free-skating forwards as Don McRae, Harry Taylor and George Robertson.

Monson admitted he was a little unsure of how the boys would be on a roomy ice surface until they played in Edmonton, but he knows now that the powerhouse line of McRae, Taylor and Gord Fashoway should be all the more potent for it in Toronto.

He expects the series to go close to seven games while confident that he has a squad that is capable of winning the prized mug.

The teams met in two games early this season in exhibition with Winnipeg winning the first 3-2 and St. Mike's taking the second 4-3. There was little to choose from in that outing.

**Pasquel Seeks Damage From Stephens, Owen**

MEXICO CITY, April 9—(AP)—Jorge Pasquel, angered over two outs in his Mexican Baseball League in the loss of big leaguers Vernon Stephens and Mickey Owen, said today he would file suit for \$100,000 against Owen, Brooklyn catcher who changed his mind about going to the Mexican loop.

Pasquel already had announced he would file a \$100,000 suit against Stephens, St. Louis Browns shortstop who played two games in the Mexican League and then left to rejoin the Browns.

In Lexington, Ky., baseball commissioner A. B. Chandler said today organized baseball would stand behind Owen and Stephens if they were sued by Mexican League interests, since "they are coming back at our call."

Pasquel's league formerly was crippled by injuries to Luis Olmo and Chico Hernandez, has been at the telephone constantly seeking new players to replace Owen and Stephens.

Sports fans have been packing the stadium all winter and the advance-booking window does a hand-off business especially Canadian servicemen are playing.

President Jorge Pasquel of the Mexican Baseball League, definitely not a tin-horn gambler, fired back a fast ball at his American critics the other day when he offered to bet \$2,000,000 that his eight-team circuit will play a full season this year.

Angered at big league owners in the United States who predict that his Mexican loop will fold up, Pasquel million dollars in the National City Bank of New York City and that any doubter in the group of doubters could take the bet by making an equal deposit.
