MONTREAL, Dec. 28 (CP)—Tiny Wilf Cude bettered Bill Beveridge tonight in one of the National Hockey League's great goal-tending duels and Cude's Canadiens defeated the Maroons 2-0.

The two Montreal teams turned on a brilliant display for the season's largest crowd here, more than 8,000 customers, and the net minders had to be the individual stars in the heavy firing. The result, consolidating Canadiens in second place in their group and Maroons in fourth, tied the clubs at two wins each in the intra-city series.

George Mantha doing a full stretch of work for the first time since he suffered an injury in the last Maroon-Canadien meeting, fired the first goal eight minutes after the start and Babe Siebert closed the scoring half way through the third period on a rink-long drive.

Through the second and early minutes of the third Cude was subject to a withering fire. Late in the first he had been forced to retire to the dressing room after stopping the puck with his forehead. Two stitches were needed to close the cut.

The Bruins pulled into a 2-0 lead on goals scored by Conroy Welland and Bill Cowley during the first three minutes of play. Six minutes after the red light flashed for Cowley, the Rangers took advantage of Dit Clapper's penalty and tied the score, Clint Smith and Cecil Dillon countering.

The count remained even until 14:45 in the third frame when Hollett fired the puck between goalie Dave Kerr's legs.

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Attendance At N.H.L. Games Shows Gain

Open Up Game Powwow Urges For Badminton

MONTREAL, Dec. 28—The National Hockey League appeared headed for a happier New Year than usual. That much is evident from a survey of this year's hockey attendance figures.

Even Montreal Maroons, who have suffered from customary apathy in the past, are at least holding their own in relation to last year's figures for the same period, and all the other clubs report sharp rises in attendance for approximately the first third of the 1937-38 campaign.

The greatest jump in statistics for New York Rangers' home games. In their first seven contests in Madison Square Garden, the Bluehirts drew 91,512 club customers, an increase of 21,657 over the first seven games in 1936. Their local rivals, the Americans, showed a gain of 3,401 in their first six home games.

Toronto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins, with 94,553 and 78,000 for eight and six home games, respectively, reported approximate gains of 12,000 each.

A turnout of 95,000 fans for Chicago Blackhawks' nine contests was labelled a "big increase" by business manager Bill Tobin, while the champion Detroit Red Wings, despite a sorry getaway toward defense of the Stanley Cup, have drawn between 7,000 and 8,000 more fans to the third of their 24 home engagements. Montreal Canadiens are up 8,000 over the corresponding period a year ago.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28—Too bad about the Letty Gomezes and Warren (Buddy) Roar. George McQuinn and Bill Hershberger, all wound up among the International's top bat men. This quintette not only captured high individual honors but led the Bears in a sweep that took most of the team honors with them.

The Bears annexed the team batting crown with an average of .299, 17 points better than the runner-up Montreal Royals; went to bat the most times, 5,263; scored the most runs, 890; made the most hits, 1,374; most total bases, 2,449; most two-baggers, 292; most triples, 80; batted in most runs, 843; didn't neglect the singles as they led in that department with 1,061; and with Buffalo tied for having the most batsmen hit by pitched balls, 22.

Baltimore Orioles, thanks to their short fences, collected their annual tribute, the home run leadership, with 163 four-baggers. Buffalo's Bisons made the most sacrifice hits, 131; Montreal stole the most bases, 74; Toronto's Leafs received the most bases on balls, 612, while Rochester Red Wings gained the dubious honor of having fanned 720 times, tops for the circuit.

Indians And Hornets Play Two-all Draw (A.
