Truman Revises Wage-Price Policy

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30 — (AP) — President Truman tonight liberalized his administration wage-price policy in an order which he said would permit business as a whole to grant increases in wages without requiring price increases.

At the same time, he told the United States in a long-awaited broadcast that "labor has a stern responsibility to see that demands for wage increases are reasonable."

The President's ruling was disclosed as a modification of his Aug. 18 executive order under which wage increases which did not affect the price structure got his backing.

Without mentioning any percentage of wage increases, the President issued simultaneously an executive order authorizing stabilization administrator John C. Collet to approve wage increases under three classifications in which the war labor board has found increases necessary to correct "misadjustment" or "inequity."

This would permit raises: 1. Where the percentage increase in average straight time hourly earnings since January 1941, has not equalled the increase in the cost of living between January, 1938 and September, 1945.

2. Where necessary to correct inequities in wage rates among plants in the same industry or locality, which due regard to normal competitive relationships.

3. Where necessary to insure full production in an industry designated by the stabilization director as essential to reconstruction and in which existing wage rates or salaries are inadequate to the recruitment of needed manpower.

The latter classification, some persons thought, might be made applicable to the steel and some building industries.

Mr. Truman called for return to the teamwork which we had during the war, and said: "Labor and management must adopt collective bargaining as the effective and mature way of doing business... as a free people, must have the good sense to bargain peaceably and sincerely."

He said he believed "industry as a whole can afford substantial wage increases without price increases," but added there were "substantial limits upon the capacity of industry to raise wages" without commensurate climbs in prices.

Hence, said the President, "public opinion will not countenance refusal on the part of either management or labor... to arrive at just conclusions... there is no reason in our economy for individual demands or for greedy individuals or groups who want their own way regardless of the cost to others."
