Presbytery Of Prince Edward Island

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular quarterly session at 11 a. m. on Tuesday March 1st in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown, and was opened in due form by the moderator, Rev. Fred Williamson. Those present were: Rev. Fred Williamson, moderator, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, clerk, Rev. Chas. J. St. Clair Jeans, Rev. W. E. Davies, Rev. R. Moorehead Legate, Rev. Alex. R. Gibson, Rev. J. Keir Fraser, D. D. Rev. G. Carlyle Webster and Rev. D. L. Griffiths, and Messrs. Thos. W. Morrison, R. G. McLaren, Angus McLean, Dougald McPherson, Samuel McPherson, A. A. McDonald and A. E. Morrison, representative elders. Others present not members of the court were Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D., Geddie Douglas, John McFarlane, A. A. McBeth, Wm. McMillan, Stewart Kinross, Norman McFadyen, Earl Foster and Wm. Duffett, elders, and Messrs. John Anderson, Jas. A. Brodie and Edward McDonald, representative laymen.

The minutes of the last regular meeting held in November last and the minutes of the special meeting held in February, having both been printed and issued in the form of a pamphlet and copies of this pamphlet having been circulated among all present, both of these sets of minutes were adopted as printed. As this was a new method of dealing with Presbytery minutes many fine comments were heard spoken in its favor and the court on motion congratulated the clerk not only on the way this new method was carried out, but also on the very fine form of the two sets of minutes printed in the pamphlet.

Before taking up the regular business of the Presbytery it was moved by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster and seconded by Rev. W. E. Davies that the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island extend to the clerk, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert its sincere sympathy in the recent sad bereavement which came to him in the quite sudden passing away of his brother Mr. J. Frederick Stavert, Wilmot Valley.

The resolution was carried unanimously by a standing vote and was extended to Mr. Stavert by the moderator. In a few well chosen words Mr. Stavert thanked the members of Presbytery and others present for the kind expression of their sympathy to him in this his hour of sorrow.

The correspondence was then dealt with. Seven applications from ministers of other churches asking to be received into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada were read by the clerk.

1—The Presbytery of London is making application to the commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. James Fletcher, B. A., a minister of the United Church of Canada, but formerly a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada—as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

2—The Presbytery of Toronto is making application to the General Assembly's commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. John Knox Clarke, B. A., a minister of the United Church of Canada, as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

3—The Presbytery of Regina is applying to the commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. W. J. McVior, M. A., S. T. D., a minister of the United Church of Canada, as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

4—The Presbytery of Toronto is making application to the commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. Harry B. Miner, B. D., a minister of the Hartford East Association of congregational churches, U. S. A., as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

5—The Presbytery of Hamilton is applying to the General Assembly's commission on the reception of ministers for leave to receive Rev. Robertson Millar, M. A., a minister of the Church of Scotland, as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

6—The Presbytery of Kootenay will apply to the General Assembly or to its commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. James Youngson, a minister of the Church of Scotland, but formerly a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

7—The Presbytery of Toronto is making application to the General Assembly's commission on the reception of ministers, for permission to receive Rev. Wm. Reynolds, a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

ing that the Presbytery of Red Deer will apply to the General Assembly or to its commission on the reception of ministers for permission to receive Rev. R. S. Stevens, a minister of the Methodist Church and now supplying Sybil Lake Memorial Church, Alberta, as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and also for permission to grant special ordination to Mr. J. M. Fraser, a catechist who has given years of splendid service to the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The report of W. M. McKay the Synodical missionary of Northern Ontario and Eastern Manitoba, who had spent about three and a half months as Synodical missionary for the Maritime Provinces, was read by the clerk.

Late in July Mr. McKay set out for the Maritime Synod. On the way east he addressed meetings at New Mills, N. B., and at Moncton, N. B., and reached P. E. Island in time for the Summer School at Canoe Cove, Aug. 4-12. During the weeks at Summer School Mr. McKay gave two addresses a day and during the week following the school he visited sixteen places and delivered seventeen addresses.

From Prince Edward Island, Mr. McKay went to Cape Breton Island. There besides having visited the nine mission fields, he addressed meetings in the churches at Sydney, Glace Bay and North Bras d'Or. In Cape Breton he held twelve meetings in all. Passing over to the mainland of Nova Scotia, Mr. McKay visited some twelve mission fields and congregations in all, and gave some twenty addresses. Next in order came New Brunswick where seven meetings in all were held.

While in New Brunswick Mr. McKay received orders to discontinue his work in the Maritimes and proceed to the west to undertake our churches' share of the construction work of the Trans-Canada-Highway. Mr. McKay felt that while some good had been accomplished by his stay in the East that yet there are many problems in connection with the mission fields waiting for solution.

Rev. F. Scott McKenzie, D. D., Principal of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, had written the clerk saying that he would like to visit the different congregations of the Presbytery in the interest of the college some time during the coming summer. It was agreed that this matter be taken up at the Presbytery meeting in May and that an itinerary be then arranged for Dr. McKenzie.

Letters were received from Rev. Geo. E. Ross, D. D., Erskine Church, Ottawa and from Rev. H. F. Dunn, Martintown, Ontario, saying that they would be spending the month of August in the Maritime Provinces and would be ready to give supply to any congregations needing supply during this month.

New Orleans Collier In Dangerous Plight

BOSTON, Mass., Mar. 8.—The Collier H. F. De Bardeleben was tossing about on rough seas 50 miles southeast of Nantucket lightship last night while her crew of 34 men anxiously awaited the dawn. Nearby, the White Star liner Adriatic stood by waiting for light enough to take the crew off the Collier, the engine of which was out of condition and could not be stopped. The De Bardeleben was bucking the high waves at a speed of seven knots while the Adriatic kept pace and three coast guard vessels were in the vicinity ready to aid in the rescue work.

The De Bardeleben, whose home port was New Orleans, left Boston Saturday night for Norfolk and yesterday ran into thick weather. Today she sent out an appeal for aid as her crew were unable to stop the engines and the ship was heading into a stiff gale.

The Adriatic, three coast guard vessels and other ships in the vicinity responded. The De Bardeleben was rolling heavily and her Captain, B. T. Knight, said the crew would be unable to hold their posts after dark and it was imperative that they be taken off. The ship was finally slowed down to seven knots but could not be stopped so that life boats could be launched. The Adriatic drew closer and the captains of the ships exchanged messages. It was finally decided to have the De Bardeleben try to ride out the gale until dawn when, if conditions were not better the crew would be taken off.

The Radio Marine Corporation in New York received a message saying Hagood was alongside the Adriatic. In reply to a message, the Bardeleben wireless: "Cannot see you yet. Have 34 aboard."
