WINDOWS SMASHED— There was a period of excitement on Saturday night about ten o'clock when an intoxicated soldier smashed both windows in the fortune telling establishment of the gypsies in the Newson Block on Richmond Street. The plate glass in these windows is fully a half inch thick and the first window to go was smashed by a blow from the man's fist, which resulted also in his arm being badly cut. The second window was smashed in by a blow from his foot. An immense crowd gathered and hung around the place for an hour or more waiting to see what next would happen. Friends of the man who had committed this act of vandalism in the meantime removed him from the scene and no arrests were made.

CHURCH MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Murray Harbor North Presbyterian Congregation, which was postponed from the second Tuesday in January on account of the local influenza epidemic, was held on Feb. 18th. All organizations in connection with the congregation presented satisfactory reports. Although the churches were closed for seven-teen Sundays during 1918, the treasurers reported balances on the right side of the general accounts, while the Presbytery's allocation to the schemes of the church had been overpaid. Extensive improvements are to be made on the church property and a new cemetery opened during the coming summer.

Halifax Garrison To Maintain Order

HALIFAX, N. S., Feb. 22.—In connection with the recent rioting here a military order embracing the "Fortress of Halifax" was issued today. It requires all ranks to assist in every way possible in the maintenance of a law and order.

MUNICH, Feb. 22.—Herr Auer, Bavarian Minister of the Interior has been shot. The shooting took place during a session of the Landtag while Auer was alluding to the assassination of Kurt Eisner, the Bavarian Premier. Auer fell, wounded in the left side and Deputy Osel was killed and two other officials were seriously wounded. The shots were fired from the public gallery and caused a panic among the deputies. The diet building is being guarded by the militia.

POLISH GOVERNMENT RECOGNIZED BY ALLIES

PARIS, Feb. 22.—Official announcement was made that the Allies at their meetings at the Quai D'Orsy decided that the Allies should recognize the Polish Government headed by Ignace Jan Paderewski.

Death of Mr. David Ross Maclellan

One of the best known and most highly respected residents of Charlottetown has been removed from the activities of this life in the passing of Mr. David Ross Maclellan, whose death occurred at his home, Upper Prince Street at 6 o'clock on Saturday evening. Mr. Maclellan had only been ill for the short space of one week and his death called forth expressions of sincere regret from many citizens, a great many of whom were unaware of his illness. The late Mr. Maclellan was in the 69th year of his age at the time of his death. He was a native of Scotland, being born in Cromarty in 1850, a son of the late Rev. John Maclellan, who came out to Prince Edward Island from Scotland in 1826 with his young wife and lived here for a number of years during which he founded St. John's Presbyterian Church at Belfast, later returning to Argyleshire to assume a charge there. After the death of his father, the late David Maclellan came to P. E. Island as a child with his mother and other members of the family to make his home here. He removed early in life to Charlottetown and for many years held a position as book-keeper in the office of the late Mr. H. J. Cunanan, discharging his duties with fidelity and ability. Mr. Maclellan was a prominent and esteemed member of the Free Masons and Odd Fellows and also of the Caledonia Club of this city and took active interest in all of them. He was devoted and consistent member of St. James Church and for many years was its treasurer. He leaves to cherish his memory, his widow, (formerly Miss Louise Compton, youngest daughter of Mr. George Compton of St. Eleanor's); one daughter, Katharine McNab Maclellan and a sister, Mrs. Katharine Macpherson of this city to all of whom the sincere sympathy of their many friends will be extended in their sad loss.

Ukrainians Att k Allied Delegation

WARSAW, Feb. 22.—Members of the interallied commission to Poland were fired upon by Ukrainian soldiers while travelling from Cracow to Limberg on a Polish armored train. The delegation returned to Cracow. The delegation from the mission was on its way to Limberg to attempt to arrange an armistice between the Poles and Ukrainians. Seven Poles on the train were wounded by Ukrainian bullets. Before making another attempt to reach Limberg the delegation will notify the Ukrainians that it is coming so that its train can reach unharmed.

France Demands Pay For 40,000 Houses
