Atomic Bomb Nothing To Trifle With

ALAMOGORDO, N.M., Nov. 11—(AP)—A New Mexico state livestock inspector reported today that cattle changed color and a rancher's horse became streaked with gray following the first atomic bomb test near here last July 16. Confessing he was skeptical before seeing the cattle, Alfred Hunter said red-coated, white-faced Herefords 25 to 30 miles from the bomb test site appeared to have a heavy frost across their backs. He said the new color was not deep and the cattle showed no signs of injury.

Jerome Kern 60-Year-Old Composer Dies

NEW YORK, Nov. 11—(AP)—Jerome Kern, 60-year-old composer whose tuneful melodies have captivated the United States and Canada for more than 30 years, died today.

The composer of "Show Boat," "Smoke Gets in Your Eyes" and many other well-known songs died in Doctors Hospital at 1:10 p.m. Dr. Harold T. Hyman, the composer's physician, said death was due to a cerebral thrombosis and that Mr. Kern had been in all oxygen tent the last three days. The musician collapsed on the Avenue in midtown Manhattan Nov. 10 and was taken unconscious to City Hospital. Later he was removed to Doctors Hospital.

The composer's wife, Eva, and their daughter, Betty, were at his bedside. Mr. Kern, a native of New York's East Side who got his start in music by "plugging" in a department store music counter, had arranged in New York from the West Coast only three days before he was stricken. He came to superstitions rehearsals of his "Show Boat" to be revived at the Ziegfeld Theatre.

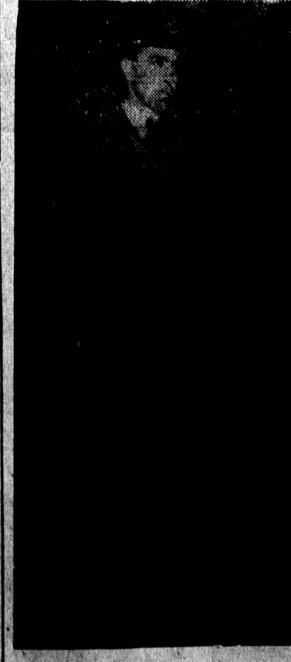
Mr. Kern had been writing songs since before the First Great War. His first hit melody was "They Didn't Believe Me" from the score of the Broadway musical "The Girl From Utah" in 1914. One of his most popular scores was "Show Boat" in which were such tunes as "Only Man River," "Why Do I Love You?" and "Babe in the Woods."

Among the Broadway shows for which he wrote the musical scores were "Very Warm For May," "The Cat and the Fiddle," "Sweet Adeline," "Roberta," "Sally" and "Shine a Good Fellow." In the best-named show in 1919, Fred and Adele Astaire danced their way to success.

His other songs included "Look For The Silver Lining," "The Night Was Made For Love," "I've Told Every Little Star," "Till The Clouds Roll By" and "Babe in the Woods." back while while the hair on his chin remained brown. 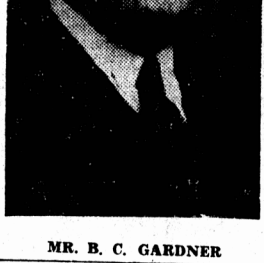

New President Of Canadian Bankers' Ass'n

TORONTO, Nov. 11—B. C. Gardner, vice-president and general manager of the Bank of Montreal, was elected president of the Canadian Bankers' Association at its annual meeting here. He succeeds S. M. Wedd, who held office for the last two years.

Honorary presidents named were: C. A. Bopart, chairman of the board of the Dominion Bank; Beaudry Lemay, president of the Banque Canadienne Nationale; J. A. McLeod, chairman of the board of the Bank of Nova Scotia; and S. H. Logan, chairman of the board of the Bank of Commerce.

Elected vice-presidents were: S. G. Dobson, vice-president and general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada; Robert Rae, vice-president and general manager of the Bank of Montreal; B. S. Austin, general manager of the Bank of Toronto; and J. U. Boyer, general manager of the Provincial Bank of Canada.

Retiring President
Canadians may regard the future with confidence so long as they retain their perspective and the ready common sense basic in the national character. Stanley M. Wedd, retiring president of the Association declared in his address. Despite the toll of war, the Canadian people stand on the threshold of extra cash lying in men's pockets of more money than they ever had before. This has piled up since

1932—\$1,131,000,000 representing an increase in savings in the chartered banks; \$241,500,000 in war savings certificates; \$4,608,100,000 in individual savings invested in Victory Bonds, and \$78,000,000 of extra cash lying in men's pockets, women's purses and the tills of business.

This great volume of money, Mr. Wedd said, carries with it definite risks and dangers, as well as definite advantage, but "if Canadians will look at their savings, realize their strength and move with confidence, their future prosperity upon a sound and ordered basis lies in their own hands."

Without hesitations, he added, Canadians could innovent themselves in a disastrous inflationary spiral.

To Aid Discharges

Mr. Wedd, vice-president and general manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce, who is retiring after two years as president of the Canadian Bankers' Association, pledged the banks through their branches across the country to furnish sympathetic counsel and understanding advice to all returning men and women who ask it.

Remembrance Day At Wheatley River

A very impressive and largely attended Remembrance Day service was held at Wheatley River yesterday. Major D. A. MacDonald presided; the speakers being the Rev. S. D. Davies, rector of St. John's Anglican Church, Milton and the Hon. W. J. P. MacMillan, O.B.E.

The first part of the service was held at the monument where a prayer was offered by the Rev. Mr. Davies and the names were read by Hon. Dr. MacMillan of those who had made the supreme sacrifice in the two World Wars. A wreath was placed by Mrs. Harold Chandler.

The service was then continued in the hall, opening with the hymn "Unto the Hills Around." Rev. Mr. Davies followed with a sermon which will long be remembered. Among other things he warned his audience that "Sin was the cause of war."

The next speaker was the Hon. Dr. MacMillan who delivered one of his ablest addresses. He emphasized that Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill during the war years was an instrument in the hands of God. The music was under the capable direction of Harold Chandler, with Mrs. Chester Rackham as organist.

Petitcodiac Report Given To Gov't

OTTAWA, Nov. 11—The engineers' report on a potential tidal power project at the confluence of the Memramook and Petitcodiac Rivers in New Brunswick has been received by the Department of Mines and Resources and copies have been forwarded to the New Brunswick Government. It was learned today.

It is expected to be possibly a week, possibly longer, before the report is tabled in the Commons. In the meantime no comment was forthcoming on its general findings.

The investigation, made at the joint expense of the New Brunswick and Federal Governments, was conducted by H.G. Acres and Company of Niagara Falls, Ont.
