CHICKEN GRAVY
 To make chicken giblets gravy, simmer the giblets, liver, gizzard and heart and the neck in a quart of water for an hour, or until tender. Drain and chop the meat finely. Leave about 1/2 cup of fat in the pan after removing the ribs. Stir in a third cup flour. Gradually add cold broth and enough cold water to make a smooth thin gravy. Cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Add the chopped giblets. Season to taste with salt and pepper.
