ANNUAL MEETING OF FRUIT GROWERS' ASSOCIATION

The Annual Meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fruit Growers' Association opened yesterday forenoon with a small attendance of members. There were only two directors present, Mr. A. E. Dewar who presided, and Mr. J. P. MacFadyen. Mr. Dewar stated that although the directors had been appointed at a meeting held in December, they had not been organized, no executives being appointed, and he did not know whether there were sufficient present to complete the organization.

Mr. F. B. Clarke, of Clarke Bros., Charlottetown, who was called upon, gave an address regarding the fruit situation on the Island from the dealer's standpoint. He gave figures showing the importations into this province, and compared these with the importations by New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. New Brunswick imports fifteen times as much as the Island does; and even Nova Scotia, although it is a fruit growing province, imports a considerable quantity of apples.

Mr. Clarke referred to the Convention of Wholesale Fruit Men which he attended in Montreal last June, and of which he was appointed Vice-President for Canada. He said that one package that the fruit growers were using for was a bushel hamper.

With regard to Prince Edward Island stock, some varieties, especially Gravensteins, were much better than the imported variety. At the same time there was a good deal of inferior stock marketed. He thought that the Island was a dumping ground for useless nursery trees. He strongly urged the grading of apples. It is no use to ship ungraded apples. In Upper Canada there are no ungraded apples shipped beyond Toronto. He pointed to the manner in which some of the Island apples were put up in barrels had good apples only on top, and in one barrel he found a pair of overalls.

Mr. Dewar said he found a prejudice against Prince Edward Island varieties, while he could not sell to local dealers he found a good market for them elsewhere.

Mr. Clarke referred to the imported apples being sprayed, and packed in oiled paper.

A further informal discussion followed.

It was asked, "If apples were graded would there not be a better market?" Mr. Dewar said it all depended on the "man behind the apples." The men who attend to their orchards get good prices for their product. It was pointed out by one speaker that there was a good market here for apples if properly packed, and thought there should be a fruit inspector. The chairman said there was not enough work for a fruit inspector, an instructor would be better.

There was considerable discussion on freight and express rates.

Mr. Jas. C. Irving, M.P.P., thought apples could be grown in this province just as successfully as in the sister provinces. He particularly in grading apples, said that they are of a uniform size and there is no reason why there should not be a market.

We spend thousands of dollars every year in bringing in apples here; we have just as intelligent people and as good soil as in the other provinces and he could not see why we could not bend our energies in this direction.

The question was asked, why not have compulsory grading? The chairman answered that grading was compulsory with packaged apples, covered, but apples in open packages were only required to

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, March 10.—An easier feeling is reported in some of the larger receiving centres due to the continued importation of United States fresh eggs and the prospects of increased local fresh receipts. Toronto wholesale fresh extras 39 to 40, firsts 35 to 36, seconds 30 to 31. Montreal market is unchanged in tone and prices with local receipts slightly heavier. Winnipeg steady market lower prices unchanged. Calgary market uncertain. Good weather is causing heavy receipts. Dealers are offering extras 26 to 27, firsts 22 to 23, seconds 19. Edmonton egg market steady receipts light. Country dealers selling to wholesalers extras 26, firsts 23, seconds 17. Vancouver easy, paying country points extras 26, firsts 24, jobbing extras 20, firsts 28, seconds and pullets 22. St. John, N. B. steady, receipts light due to bad roads. Country dealers selling extras 40, firsts 25. Halifax, N. S., no change in egg or poultry prices.

MONTREAL, March 10.—The trade in cash grain in the domestic market was quieter today, the demand being only for odd cars for local account and spot prices are unchanged. Business in all categories in the flour market was of a very limited character, the undertone to the market being about steady and prices unchanged. There was an increased demand for millfeed and a larger volume of business was done. The market was active and the undertone steady. Prices were unchanged. There was no change in the condition of the baled hay market. Eggs were again easy today and prices scored another decline of 1 cent per doz. which was due to the increased supplies. The demand was good and an active trade was done with sales of extras at 40 to 41. Firsts at 34 to 35, and seconds 30 to 31, cents per dozen. The undertone to the market for potatoes was firm. The demand was more or less small and a moderate amount of business was done in Quebec varieties at 2.50 per 90 pound bag extra. The

That the town of Summerside is interested in the civic affairs was shown in the very large attendance of citizens at the first meeting of the new Town Council held in the Council Chambers on Monday night. The meeting started with His Worship Mayor Lidstone presiding and Councillors Schurman, Taylor, Johnston, McNally and Phillips present. Councillor Grady being still confined to his home through illness was unable to be present. He was excused from meetings by the Council until the end of April.

Bills amounting to \$1438.80 were read and passed as were also the minutes of the previous meeting of the old Council.

The following standing committees were moved by Councillor Phillips and seconded by Councillor Johnston:—

Finance and Purchasing—Councillors Grady, Schurman and Taylor.

Streets—Councillors Phillips, McNally and Schurman.

Police—Councillors Johnston, McNally and Phillips.

Property—Councillors Schurman, Taylor and Johnston.

Fire and Light—Councillors McNally, Phillips and Schurman.

Assessors—Councillors Taylor, McNally and Johnston.

School and Parks—Councillors Taylor, Grady and Johnston.

Councillor Taylor asked His Worship why he was relieved of his duties on the Fire and Light Committee as all the other committees were practically the same as last year.

His Worship said there was no reason on his part. It was unfortunate that in arranging the committees that Councillor Taylor had been left off this particular committee.

Councillor Johnston asked if it naturally followed that a man was retained in the chairmanship of a committee from year to year.
