S'ide C. W. L. Annual Report

The following report of the year's activities was read by the Recording Secretary, at the annual meeting of Summerside subdivision, C. W. L. on Wednesday evening, April 2.

Membership: During the year we held 10 regular, and four executive meetings. At the end of our year, our Treasurer's report shows that all our Diocesan and National expenses have been provided for and that all bills have been paid. The report shows a balance at the end of March of \$79.84.

We have a paid up membership of 52, with 19 new members during the year; there were also two brides who were received into the League and given a year's membership free.

Magazines: We have nine paid subscriptions to the League Magazine.

Publicity: All meetings and other activities were duly reported in our local papers, and the Charlottetown Guardian by our Press Convention.

Citizenship: We are represented on the following societies: Red Cross, Children's Aid, Ladies Aid, of Prince County Hospital, local association of Girl Guides, Home & School Group, League of Mercy, (now being chartered) and the St. Dunstan's Scholarship Fund.

During the year, members assisted in drives for funds held by Red Cross, Salvation Army, Cancer League. One of our members was appointed as the executive in Home School Group. We also sent two delegates to Charlottetown to attend special meetings for the T. B. League and the Scholarship Fund.

Social Service: We continued during this year to provide milk for a needy family of children where the father is an invalid, and we also helped out two other families, providing a complete layette and other clothing for one of the families.

We assisted the Sisters of the Convent in preparing children for First Holy Communion. At Christmas time, boxes were also sent to our Convent, St. Vincent's Orphanage, Sisters of the Precious Blood, T. B. League, and the Crippled Children's Fund.

Girl Guides and Youth Organizations: We sponsor the 2nd and 4th companies of Girl Guides. We also contributed \$25.00 to these companies to aid them in their year's work. There are 20 Brownies, and 42 Guides enrolled with 2 captains and 2 lieutenants.

The Catholic Guides gave a very creditable showing at the Guides Concert, which was held in the High School Auditorium this winter.

We contributed \$25.00 to the K. of C. to help with their boys' camp which is held each year at Rustico.

Education: We contributed prizes in June to the Convent and High School; also prizes for Catholicism for Sunday School; our members contributed \$50.00 towards the St. Dunstan's Scholarship Fund for girls.

Red Cross and War Work: There was not a great deal of work done at the Red Cross rooms, but some of our members attended there weekly. The members also helped in the Red Cross Drive, D. F. There was no work commended on her faithful and energetic work in this connection. Members of the Notre Dame Club, knitted and handed in 9 sleeveless sweaters for the Red Cross purposes.

In May, 1946, we collected 420 cans of food and \$20.00 in cash for the European relief, assisted by Guides and Scouts.

When the "Relief for China" drive came on, one of our members, Mrs. Harold Huestis, had a card party at her home, making an amount of \$17.00. We added to this amount from our funds, and sent a cheque for \$25.00 to the fund.

We also sent a cheque for \$5.00 for the Holy Father's Appeal for the suffering peoples of Europe.

Programmes and general entertainment: After most of our regular meetings, we held a social hour, which consisted of cards, entertainment, and refreshments.

There was an annual card party in 1946, owing to the lack of accommodation, but we held weekly parties in May and part of June.

The annual dance was held at the Blue Moon Dance Hall on November 14th, under the sponsorship of Mrs. Carl Delaney and it was proved to be a decided success, the amount of \$179.17 being realized.

Our annual envelope collection amounted to \$298.

In December, our meeting took the form of a Christmas Party for the children of the Orphanage, and the parcels handed in were packed and sent on to the Orphanage along with a cheque from the League.

Also in December, we had a farewell party for one of our members who was leaving town to take a position elsewhere. There was a programme of music, songs, refreshments, and the guest of honor was presented with a wool blanket.

The January meeting was arranged to coincide with Citizenship week. We entertained the British war brides of our service men. We had twelve of our new citizens at this meeting and also 15 other new members from town.

An address of welcome was read by our citizenship convenor, Mrs. Elmer Pineau, and our pastor, Rt. Rev. G. J. MacLellan also addressed them extending a warm message of welcome, as citizens to our country, our town, and members of our league. This was followed by our regular meeting, after which a programme of songs, music, dancing and other entertainment was carried out under the able direction of Mrs. Harold Huestis, assisted by our committee.

In June, we were honored by a visit from our Diocesan President,

Mrs. Austin Murphy, who addressed the meeting.

A Mass is offered up each month for the living and deceased members of our League. In November, we had Masses said for the souls in purgatory, and men of our parish who have made the supreme sacrifice in both wars, and on Armistice Day we placed a wreath at the foot of the monument for our fallen service men.

Flowers were provided for the altar at Easter time; and flowers and fruit were sent to our sick members, also letters of sympathy to the bereaved members.

During the year we sold two sets of lottery tickets for Diocesan funds. These were distributed among our members, sold the money and the stubs returned to Charlottetown.

Also a cushion top, donated by Mrs. Harold Huestis, was lotteried the proceeds from same being \$50.00. This amount was given in for the building fund of our church.

We have also undertaken to provide some necessary vestments for our church, and 1 men for an altar rail for the convent chapel.

These articles will be ordered during the month of April.

Our Treasurer's report shows an amount of \$490.00 taken in during the year; with an expenditure of \$410.46, leaving a balance of \$79.84.
