SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS FOR ZURICH

BOSTON, Mass., June 12—Hundreds of Sunday School workers thronged the White Star Line docks today and gave an enthusiastic "bon voyage" to the steamship Canopic as she steamed away for Europe carrying the main body of the American delegates to the World's Sunday School Convention which is to be held next month in Zurich, Switzerland.

School Convention which is to be held next month in Zurich, Switzerland. Five hundred delegates sailed on the Canopic, which was specially chartered for the trip. Nearly all of the States and several of the Canadian Provinces were represented in the party.

The Canopic party, though it is the largest single party of American delegates and includes nearly all of the Sunday school association officials, represents only a comparatively small part of the whole army of American delegates who will attend the Zurich convention. Other parties

representing the United States are scheduled to sail later in the month from New York, Philadelphia and Boston, while two large parties of Canadian delegates are to depart from Montreal, the first sailing next Saturday and the second on Saturday week. It is estimated that the total number of Americans at the convention will be not less than two thousand.

The convention at Zurich will be the seventh great gathering of its kind that has been held under the auspices of the World's Sunday School Association. Marion Lawrence of Toledo, O., who is the general secretary of the World's Association, states that all indications point to a larger attendance than at any of the previous conventions. Every country of Europe has promised a large representation.

The convention will have its formal opening on July 8. The program will have for its general theme "The Sunday School and the Great Commission," and for eight days Sunday school specialists from all parts of the world will give their thought to the consideration of the problem of "The Sunday School Conquest of the World."

One of the strong features of the convention will be the Sunday School roll call of nations, with five-minute responses from representatives of forty countries. A choir of five hundred voices under the leadership of Professor A. J. Bucher of Cincinnati will be another feature. For the convention concert the Tonhalle Zurich Symphony Orchestra of forty-two pieces, one of the finest in all Europe, will contribute to the program.

Americans who will appear on the program as speakers include Bishops Vincent, Neulsen and Hartzell, H. J. Heinz of Pittsburgh, Dr. H. M. Hamill of Nashville, Frank L. Brown of Brooklyn, Dr. M. G. Brumbaugh of Philadelphia, Miss Annie Jarvis of Philadelphia and E. K. Warren of Three Oaks, Mich. (Rev. E. S. Weeks of Mt. Stewart has left to represent Prince Edward Island.)

EMINENT FINANCIERS MET IN OTTAWA

The convention, which will continue two days, promises to be a fruitful as well as a notable gathering. President Borden has promised to be a speaker at the convention banquet, while Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, Dr. Wikie, president of the Canadian Bankers' Association, and a number of other men prominent in the public and financial life of the Dominion will take part.

STATE CONVENTION OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR UNION

SUPREME COURT AT SUMMERSIDE

(Special by Phone) SUMMERSIDE, June 11.—When Supreme Court resumed in Summerside this morning the case of Jas. A. Webster was first taken up before the Chief Justice and a jury and occupied the attention of the court until about 12 o'clock when the case went to the jury, who after being out about fifteen minutes returned with the verdict of guilty. In this case the prisoner who was a hired man with a man named Keough in North Tryon, has been found guilty of stealing the sum of \$80 while employed there. Part of the stolen money was found on him when arrested on a charge of larceny. In this case the Attorney General conducted the case for the crown, the prisoner not being represented by counsel.

The next case up was the King vs John Murray, which occupied the attention of the court for the remainder of the day and will be again taken up on court resuming this morning. In this case the prisoner is accused of setting fire to a barn belonging to a man named Horne, situated in Lot 4. The burning took place in 1909. For the crown several witnesses were examined but the principal witness was Chas. Burke. His evidence consisted chiefly of a confession which he claimed the prisoner made to him a short time ago. The case for the crown was finished about 3 p. m., and evidence of the witnesses for the defence occupied the remainder of the afternoon session of the court. The Attorney General is conducting the case for the crown and McQuarrie, K. C., and McCallum for the prisoner. J.

INSPECTION

Yesterday afternoon at Victoria Park the annual inspection of the 4th Regiment Heavy Artillery took place at 2 o'clock. The men lined up at the Drill Hall under command of Col. Peake, and headed by the regimental band marched to Victoria Park. After the men had formed company, Colonel H. E. Borstall, the Inspector of Artillery in Canada, came on the field, and immediately after the general salute was given. The Brigade was then inspected in marching, standing drill, etc., after which they returned to the Drill Hall and the muster roll was called. At 7 o'clock the gun detachments of No. 3 Battery were ordered and proceeded to Victoria Park where they were inspected in gun drill. To-night the gun detachments of No. 4 Battery will turn out, thus completing the inspection. Colonel Borstall expressed himself pleased with the general physique and appearance of the men, and the way in which they conducted themselves.
