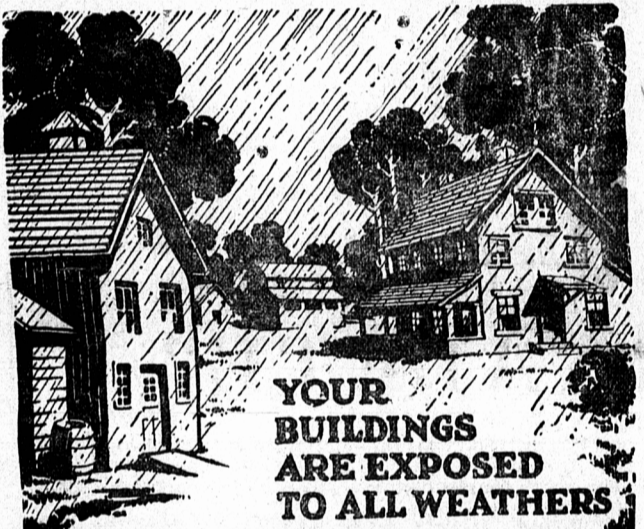

Weeks assisted by Rev. Mr. McDougall and Rev. W. P. McVie. Interment was at Pownal.

FUNERAL YESTERDAY.—The funeral of the late Mr. W. H. Crosskill took place yesterday afternoon and was fairly largely attended. The pall-bearers were Chief Justice Sullivan, Mr. Justice Haszard, Mr. A. B. Warburton, ex-Governor McKinnon, Hon. W. S. Stewart and ex-Mayor Lyons. The body was taken to St. Paul's Church, where a brief service was held, and the funeral then proceeded to the People's cemetery, where interment was made. As a mark of respect of the deceased the flag on the Government building was half-masted.

S. S. NIRVANA.—The S. S. Nirvana, of the New York Yacht Club, arrived in Charlottetown some time before noon yesterday from Newport, Rhode Island, which place she left on Sunday to take in a supply of coal. The Nirvana, which is owned by ex-Senator Nelson, of Rhode Island, is a pleasure boat and is bound for Labrador on a three-weeks fishing cruise. She leaves Charlottetown at noon to-day for Point du Chene, where she will take on a party of five. Mr. Nelson himself is on board. The Nirvana is 215 feet long by 27 feet and is of 539 tons burthen. Her speed is 15 knots.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Alexander Stewart, of the firm of Murdoch and Stewart, lobster packers of Pictou Island, was drowned on Saturday off his factory, says a Pictou Exchange. With two other men he was going to a gasoline boat which had sunk, when the dory capsized in the surf. The other two managed to make their way to the shore, but it was ten minutes before Stewart was got out, and although the body was warm, he was extinct. He was a strong, splendidly built man, and it is thought that the dory hit him when it turned over. Deceased was forty years of age. The body was taken to his home in High Bank, P. E. I. on Sunday on S. S. Arcadia, owned by Fred Magee, Limited, who are also lobster packers on Pictou Island. The deceased leaves a wife and four children.

MILITARY PARADE.—A splendid parade of the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade took place last evening, Nos. 3 and 4 Batteries, mustering 222 officers and gunners, were reviewed by Lieut. Col. A. A. Peake, at Victoria Park. The Regiment was in splendid form and went through the regimental manoeuvres excellently. Music was furnished by the Fourth Regiment Band of twenty-four pieces. CADET INSTRUCTORS COURSE.—A six weeks' course to qualify male teachers as Cadet Instructors will take place at Halifax, N. S. commencing on July 7th. The pay and allowance will be \$2.00 per day, the teachers finding their own board and lodging. Free transportation will be given to those authorized to attend, and return transportation to those who succeed in taking a certificate. Only male teachers who already possess a Grade "B" Physical Training Certificate will be admitted to the course. Applications to attend must be sent to the Education Office not later than June 18th. Each applicant must state his qualifications and give clearly his address and the station from which transportation will be required.
