**What Part Should Reason Play?**

A Philosophic Western writer speaks  
thus of the part reason should play in

wait, the newspapers, instead of ridi-  
cling or reproving them, make much of the  
affair, call it a romantic flight, print  
photographs of the couple and encourage  
other couples to imitate their madness.  
Love is a strange and sometimes a  
fleeting emotion, and it behooves all who  
feel it stirring in their blood to go slow-  
ly and to follow the guidance of their  
reason rather than their passion. There  
are so many cases of passing infatuation  
mistaken for love that a man or woman,  
perceiving the symptoms within, should  
carefully analyze the case and by many  
tests determine whether it be the genu-  
ine article or one of the many counter-  
feits. A man should project his reason,  
as it were, out of himself and study him-  
self and the girl impartially as though  
they were strangers. He should ask  
himself whether they are of equal mental  
ability and equal education, whether  
their tastes are similar, whether they are  
well matched physically, whether she in-  
terests him merely because of her pretty  
face and figure, whether he could agree  
with his people-in-law in the event of his  
marrying the girl, and whether he could  
support her in the degree of comfort or

tomed. He should consider, too, the prob-

happy with him. He should weigh his  
own faults and even tell the girl about

week. It is easy to be good-humored

al dinners, but a man and woman, going

ery day in the year. He who raves  
about the curls in her hair, when he

ribbons and bows and all the helps to  
loveliness that women know; but the

the piano, getting up in the morning as  
well as dancing in a ballroom. Similarly,  
the man a girl marries ought to please  
her when his beard is two days old as  
well as when it has been lately shaven,  
in his business clothes as well as in his  
handsome evening suit.

Courtship is one thing and matrimony  
quite another. Matrimony is life, and  
life is full of dullness and routine. Court-  
ship is a round of dances, dinners, moon-  
light conversations, romantic walks, per-

and the question which reason should
