105TH COMFORT CIRCLE.—At a representative meeting of the 105th Comfort Circle held last week a strong resolution was passed favoring the retaining of the Rena McLean Hospital in this city.

WORST GALE YET.—It is the general opinion of all the old land marks of Summerside that last night's gale was the worst that was ever experienced in those provinces.

HORSEMEN PREPARING.—A meeting of the P. E. I. Racing Association which was organized last year, has been called for, March 16 during the horse show, to allot dates and make arrangements for the season's racing.

PURCHASED SPEED.—Messrs Kennedy and McNeill, the well-known horsemen have completed the purchase of speed in the United States. The new-comer has no mark but from all reports is evidently going to make one.

CHANGES IN DRILL HALL.—An engineer officer from Military District No. 6, Halifax has been in the city for the past few days securing information regarding changes required in the Drill Hall in view of the re-organization of militia to take place shortly.

P. E. I. ON BISLEY TEAM.—It is likely that P. E. Island will be represented on this year's Bisley Team. The Council of the Provincial Rifle Association having been asked by Ottawa to submit names of eligible candidates for the team.

TO HAND OVER HOSPITAL.—Colonel Hayes, medical director for the district of P. E. Island and Nova Scotia and Captain Ladd are expected here on the 26th to hand over the Rena McLean Memorial Hospital to the provincial government. It is likely that the equipment will be distributed among the local hospitals.

TO REVIVE INTER-PROV. SHOOTING.—The Inter-Provincial Rifle-Being is interested to hear that the Inter-Provincial Rifle Match will be revived this year. The contest will take place this year in Nova Scotia in June. The match was last shot in 1913 at St. John, N. B. when P. E. I. was victorious. In the last six shots for the trophy P. E. Island won it four times, and Nova Scotia twice. The record for the event—762 points—is also held by P. E. Island and was made in Charlottetown in 1911. The next nearest record is 739 also made by P. E. I. at St. John in 1910.

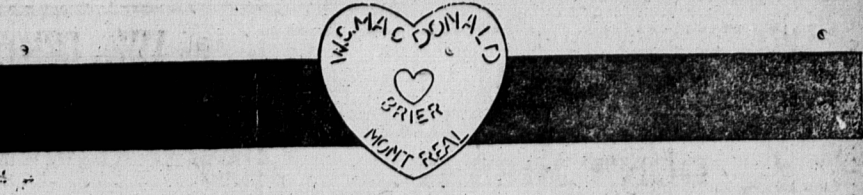
IN MEMORIAM
