Higher Education Teaches Girls To Look Before Leaping Into Matrimony

DEAR MISS DIX: Do college women want to marry? Since leaving college 17 years ago I have proposed to at least 150 women college graduates, secretaries, school teachers, bookkeepers, nurses and other professional women. Each said no. I asked why. The reason seemed to be that I did not have enough money. I have less than \$500 in the bank, but I earn \$50 a week.

When I suggest marriage to them as an investment, they can't see it. They even blow up when I propose that we buy a car together, and say that they don't see why they should put any money into a car for me. I tell them that all of this money I am saving my wife will get when I die and that it is safer than a government bond, and that the investment return will be at least 1,000 per cent.

I cannot understand why women can't take marriage as a business partnership, and again I ask if college women want to marry?

ANSWER: Your letter is the best argument I ever have read in favor of a college education for girls. 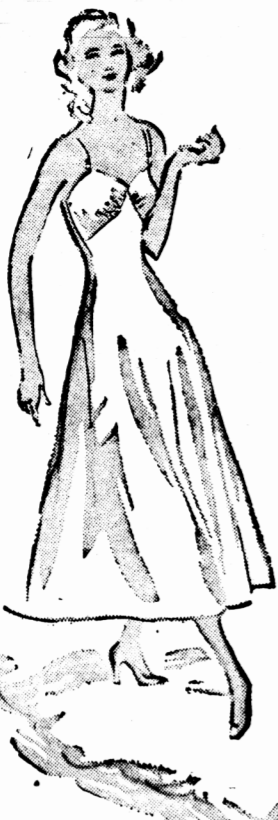

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That Body Of Yours

THREE CLASSES OF SINUSITIS

For many years, the practice of many nose and throat specialists consisted of straightening the septum (the division wall between the nostrils), removing obstructions, and widening the opening into the various sinuses adjoining the nose, which gave the sinuses better ventilation and drainage.

In doing these surgical operations, much of the lining or mucous membrane of the nose was removed or destroyed. As this lining helps to fight off harmful organisms in the air, nose specialists now are careful about doing damage to this lining; and nose operations are not as numerous as in former years. Surgery also caused some loss of the sense of smell.

An irritation of the lining of the sinuses causes a flow of water and mucus which runs down into the back of the throat. A real inflammation of the lining of the sinuses, causing thick mucus or pus, is called sinusitis and requires careful skilled treatment.

In "Laryngoscope" Dr. F. Johnson Putney, Jefferson Hospital, Philadelphia, speaks of the change in the ideas of nose specialists regarding sinusitis. They now realize the importance of the lining of the nose in preventing various airborne diseases. The new drugs, penicillin and the sulfa drugs, are very effective against these diseases, once they have attacked the lining.

"Restoration rather than destruction of diseased tissue is the chief aim." When the lining of the nose has been destroyed, it is too late to use these drugs, and surgery must be used. However, the early use of the sulfa drugs and penicillin makes surgery unnecessary in the majority of cases. "Once the lining has lost its moist surface and has become hard and fibrous, drugs are of little use and surgery becomes necessary."

Sinusitis is classified as follows: (1) allergic; (2) mechanical (blockage); (3) sinusitis caused by organisms (bacteria).

Once a case of sinusitis is put in its proper class, the special or specific treatment for this class gives excellent results. The allergic class is treated by the special allergic substance discovered as the cause, the mechanical-causing obstruction is treated by surgery, and the class caused by organisms—the bacteria type—is treated with the sulfa drugs and penicillin, particularly penicillin.

Cake

If one finds that there is not sufficient milk for the baking of a cake, merely add water until the required amount is reached. In this instance "watered milk" will make no difference. Sometimes it even makes the cake a little lighter.

Marking Linens

Cook's Corner

MOCHA FROSTING

5 tablespoons butter
1 lb. confectioners' sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa
3 tablespoons milk
3 tablespoons freshly made coffee
Few grains salt
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
Cream butter. Sift sugar and cocoa, gradually add to butter, creaming constantly. Add enough milk and coffee to make mixture right consistency for spreading. Add salt and vanilla extract. Enough to fill and frost two 9-inch layers.

APPLE CHUTNEY

1 quart green tomatoes
18 sour apples
3 large onions
1 lb. seeded raisins
2 lbs. brown sugar
2 red peppers
1-2 cups vinegar
1-4 cup salt
1 tablespoon ginger
1 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon mustard seed
1 teaspoon celery seed
Cut tomatoes and onion, sprinkle 2 tablespoons of salt over them and let stand all night. Next day, drain, chop apples and peppers. Add raisins, mustard, celery seed, salt, pepper, paprika.

Sift together first 3 ingredients. Cut in shortening. Beat egg in measuring cup; add milk to make 1/2 cup; add to first mixture. Roll out 1/4 inch thick, on floured board. Chop hard-boiled eggs, mix with remaining ingredients, spread on dough. Roll up like jelly roll and bake in hot oven (425° F.) 30 minutes. Serve with cheese sauce.
