Mr. Buckley owned considerable property in Seattle, and for the last few years had been giving his attention to managing the estate which he has inherited and acquired.

**SOME BAD ROADS.**—Mr. McNeill, mail driver between Charlottetown and Hampton complains that some sections of his itinerary have not been properly attended to after the recent thaw and snowstorm. At Bell's Hill, North River, yesterday, he had difficulty in saving the life of his horse and that only after considerable damage was done to the harness. The dangerous condition of this piece of road is such that he will not undertake it this morning but will take the ice from Charlottetown to North River Bridge. There are other sections also which have been neglected. The Road Masters should exercise greater care at times like the present as neglect means a serious inconvenience to the public as well as an injustice to the mail drivers, who are expected to make their daily rounds. The Guardian understands that the mail driver purposes taking action against those Roadmasters who have neglected their duties.

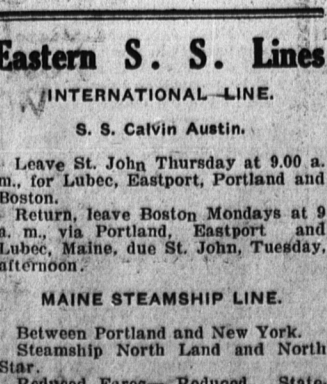
