OTTAWA, Oct 26—The test case brought by the Lord's Day Alliance against A. B. Charron, of Aylmer, for keeping his moving picture theatre open on Sunday, was dismissed with costs by Magistrate Railville in the Hull Court. The Magistrate could find no article in the statutes under which a moving picture establishment could be classified, a moving picture show was not labor, nor a business, nor yet a theatrical performance. The Lord's Day Alliance will appeal.

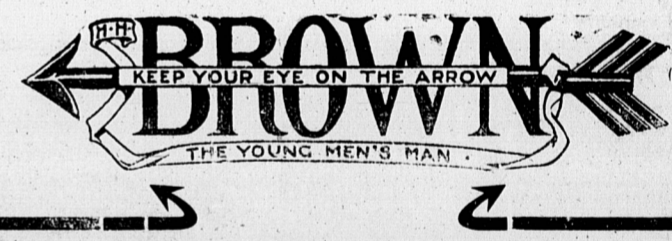

### JEALOUS HATRED CAUSE OF STABBING.

MONTREAL, Oct 25—Love, jealousy and hatred caused the fierce encounter in Vitre street on Saturday night in which Richard Panoluf, of 83 Vitre street, was stabbed twice in the back and neck by a Bulgarian assailant. It was in a quarrel over a pretty young Polish woman that the two men were fighting on the street. The young woman who was the object of the quarrel and bloodshed was employed in Panoluf's establishment on Vitre street, where the Bulgarian met her and first declared his love. She feared rather than loved her admirer, but he was so determined to win her by force if necessary that it is said he tried to kidnap her several times. Panoluf, her employer, however, acted as the woman's protector, and defended her from the ardent Bulgarian's advances.

Last Saturday night the quarrel came to the knife point resulting in Panoluf's removal to the General Hospital, stabbed in two places. At 11 o'clock that night the Bulgarian came to Panoluf's establishment and

### ITALIAN STABBED AT PORT ARTHUR.

PORT ARTHUR, Ont, Oct 26—Refusing to tell who shot and stabbed him or other particulars of the affair, Paffel Skutro, an Italian, is hovering between life and death with two bullets in his neck and a large knife wound under the right ear. The shooting followed a row last evening in an Italian boarding house on Algonquin street.

The boarding master, Geo Giovanni, and his cousin, Mike, are retained by the police. The wounded man was last winter convicted as an accomplice with Sam Pannalatico in the extortion of \$250, from John Vesh by "Black hand" methods and Pannalatico was sent up for two years and Skutro fined \$100.

### PARTICULARS OF WRECK OF STEAMER HESTIA.

ST. JOHN, Oct 27—It is now learned that thirty four persons, including four Scotch immigrant boys, perished in the wreck of the steamer Hestia. Only six of forty have been saved, and these men are in greatly weakened condition, as a result of their terrible ordeal.

The steamer crashed on rocks off and by the time they reached deck, Grand Manan, about one o'clock yesterday morning in a blinding storm. The majority of the crew were below and it was believed the steamer would be shattered in a very few moments. Three boats were launched, the first one carried the four boys and twelve of the crew. Scarcely had they taken their places when the tackle gave way and all went into the water. The poor little lads, beyond the reach of assistance called pitifully for help. One chap crying "Mamma, save me I'm drowning," his voice rapidly growing weaker. Meanwhile those aboard launched another boat in the endeavor to save their comrades, but were unable to handle the boat in the heavy seas. A third boat also launched, was too small to carry all who remained, and six of the

### crew were compelled to stay aboard the steamer. These were the only ones saved. They prepared a raft, but were able to keep above water on the steamer until daylight, when, with the falling seas, life savers reach'd them.
