POLES TAKE 25,000 PRISONERS AND MANY GUNS

(Dom. Press Special.)

WARSAW, May 4.—The latest communique declares the Soviet for sign commissary proposed opening peace negotiations at Gredno or Bialystok. The Poles have taken more villages and occupied Fastoff railway station, it claims. In past five days the statement says that the Poles have taken 25,000 prisoners, 120 guns, 418 machine guns and quantities of material.

RUSSIANS EVACUATE KIEFF LONDON, May 4.—Russian Soviet troops evacuated Kieff last Thursday and retreated to Kharovk, a Warsaw despatch to the Daily News said today. The Poles entered the city on Sunday under the personal command of General Pilsudski, the despatch said, adding that they were welcomed by the people. Other despatches said fierce fighting was still in progress in region of Kieff.

CANADIAN REPRESENTATION IN WASHINGTON

(Dom. Press Special.)

LONDON, May 4.—If Canada is permitted to establish an individual diplomatic representative in Washington three other Great Britain colonies may be expected to ask for the same privilege. This is the personal opinion of several members of the foreign office staff voiced today. The colonies they referred to are New Zealand, South Africa and Australia. These officials take the view that the colonies should be accorded the fullest freedom in conducting their international tariff, customs, boundaries and immigration affairs. Only matter, which should be strictly reserved for the British Ambassador are those pertaining to the foreign policy of the Empire as a whole, they believe.

Policeman Killed Two Wounded

DUBLIN, May 4.—A police sergeant was killed and two constables were wounded when they were fired on from ambush while cycling from Listowel to Ballyvongford, County Kerry, according to messages here today.

OFFERING RANSOM FOR DAUGHTER

NEW YORK, May 3.—An advertisement offering to ransom his fourteen year old daughter Henretta, who has been missing for two weeks was inserted in a New York newspaper today by Louis Bulite, a cigar manufacturer.

Mr Bulite said the advertisement was inserted in compliance with demands in a letter received by him purporting to have been sent by kidnapers. The girl disappeared while on her way to a bank to deposit \$255 for her father.

HOLD YOUNG GIRL ON MURDER CHARGE

ST. LOUIS, May 3.—Sixteen-year-old Ursula Broderick went to trial for the third time here today charged with the murder of her stepfather, Joseph F. Woodlock. Attorneys said she was the youngest girl ever to face a first degree murder in Missouri.

A continuance was granted the first time her case was called for trial and at the second trial the jury disagreed.

In 1916 Miss Broderick shot and killed her father, T. P. Broderick, and a coroner's jury exonerated her when she testified she shot in defence of her mother.

The State contented at the second trial for the alleged murder of Woodlock that he was killed as he lay asleep. Miss Broderick testified she killed him when he attacked her. Mrs. Woodlock is charged with plotting her husband's death, and will be tried after her daughter.
