### Chain Stores To Again Hold Spotlight

(G.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—Chain operations will again be to the fore when the Royal Commission on price spreads and mass buying continued its investigation tomorrow. During the present week, it is expected, certain submission will be made on behalf of the chain stores dealing with the evidence of commission investigators and former employees already received.

Last week the commission learned of a few tricks employed to fool the thrifty housewife. Former employees of two chains told how they had mixed salt with sugar, water with vinegar and milk with cream in order to add a few cents to the profit of their stores, and thus make up some of the shortages charged against them by the companies.

### Killed While Wood-cutting

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Dec. 2.—For Louis Gallah, 19, the wages of wood-cutting were death. A youthful co-worker, Mark Gahan, suffered a severe injury to an arm when a circular saw broke while the two young men were cutting wood at Gallah's home on the Chaplin Island road about ten miles from Newcastle.

Gallah died a few minutes after he was struck by a flying piece of the saw. Fifteen stitches were required to close a gap opened on Gahan's arm by another fragment of the flying metal.

The accident happened before the eyes of Gallah's father.

### French Govt. Secures Vote Of Confidence

(G. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PARIS, Dec. 2.—With an impressive victory to his government's credit, Premier Pierre-Etienne Flandin was preparing tonight to push his programme of economic reforms.

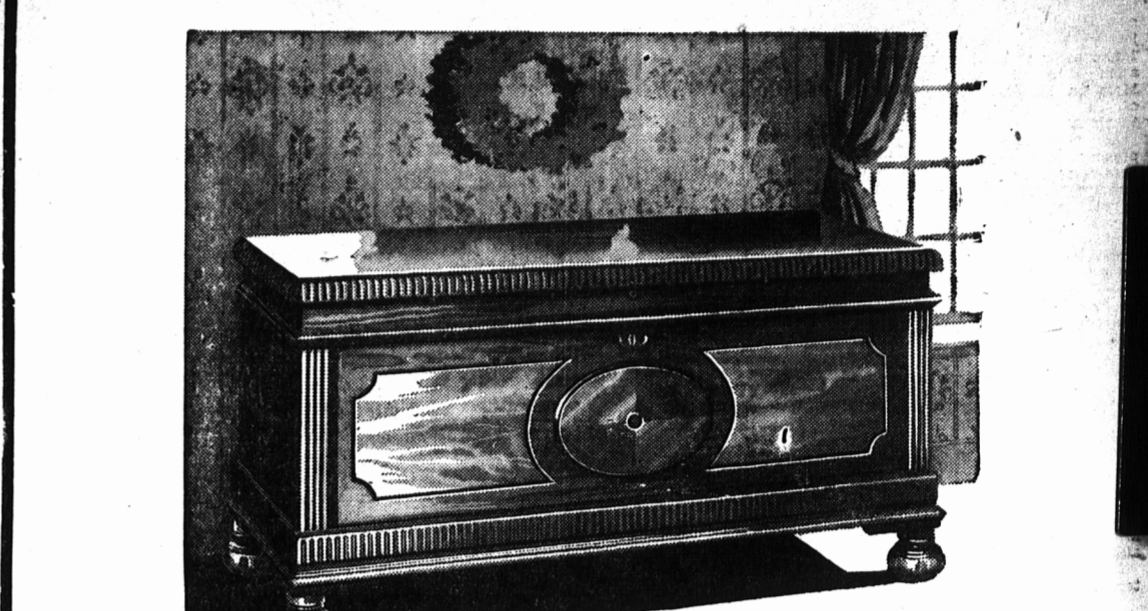
After a session crowded with exciting talk of rearmament in Germany, anxiety about the forthcoming plebiscite in the Saar territory and the unexpected tension in international affairs resulting from Yugoslavia's indictment of Hungary in connection with the assassination of her king, the government received an overwhelming vote of confidence — 487 to 150 — late yesterday when the Chamber passed the budget.

Some totalling 47,573,000,000 francs (about \$3,023,245,000) were appropriated. Included were about \$790,000,000 for the French war chest.

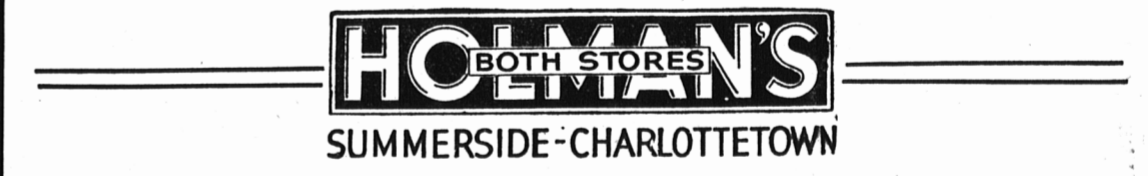
