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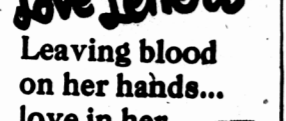

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Committed To Supreme Court

Egg And Poultry Market Report

There is very little change in the egg market since last week. Receipts are light with demand good resulting in rising prices.

Producers showing quite a fluctuation. Egg quality is not as good as could be with still too many under-grade eggs being marketed. This is poor business for the producer when one considers the spread in prices between A and B grades which is ten to fifteen cents per dozen.

P. E. I. stations are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered: A—large, 42-45; A-medium, 40-42; A-pullet and B, 38-40; C, 21-22. Graded shipments delivered: Charlottetown: A—large, 41-2-41-2; A-medium, 45; A-pullet and B, 35; C, 27.

Specialized producers are receiving for their eggs: A—large, 50; A-medium, 48; A-pullet, 37.

Poultry receipts show very little increase over last week. Chicken continues to be of low quality, poorly fleshed and unattractive.

Keen sorrow was felt throughout Lakeville and surrounding districts when it became known that Mrs. Vesta C. Rose, wife of Mr. Starbird J. Rose, passed away at the P. E. I. Hospital on July 13th in her 67th year.

She was the eldest child of Isaac A. Stewart, Red Point and Margaret Cormack, Cullinane, Scotland. She is survived by her husband, a son, Mr. Starbird J. Rose, and a daughter, Mrs. E. M. Maclean, all of whom she leaves behind her.

In her home, friends and strangers alike received the glad hand of welcome. She was a woman of a disposition which won for her a host of friends who will cherish her memory.

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Particular mention may be made of her devotion to work in the Women's Institutes, where her wise counsel was ever appreciated. She was a member of the Executive Committee of the P. E. I. Women's Institutes for two years.

It was during this period that she was sent as a delegate to the Federated Women's Institute Convention which met in Wingham. During her five months of illness in the hospital, she was the recipient of many letters, cards and flowers as well as numerous visits from her friends which she greatly appreciated and from which she derived much encouragement.

Mrs. Rose was a member of the South Lake Christian Church. Surviving are her husband and five brothers—Garfield, on the homestead, Frank of British Columbia, Stanley and Percy of Connecticut and Spencer of Oumbridge, Mass.

One brother, Oliver, and her only sister (RUBY) Mrs. Harry Rheuberg, Waltham, Mass., predeceased her. The service at her late home and South Lake Church was conducted by Rev. H. R. Bell and a large congregation assembled to pay their tribute of respect.

GLASGOW ENTERS MILK BUSINESS—GLASGOW, Aug. 7.—(CP)—Glasgow corporation soon may seek legislative authority from parliament to supply 1,000,000 customers with 90,000 gallons of milk daily to be paid for with their taxes.

Details of the plan now are being worked out by a divic committee instructed to report to a corporation meeting in September. Ballie Edward Hunter, an examiner who pioneered municipal milk supply in Willington, N. Z., 20 years ago, is author of the plan for Glasgow.

Already the city government is the largest dairy farming unit in Scotland with herds totalling 1,500 head and 4,700 acres of land supplying 350,000 gallons of tubercle-tested milk yearly to city hospitals. Co-operative societies supply one-third of the milk consumed in the city where there are 11,460 dairies of all types.

Under the plan the city would establish a monopoly making it unlawful for any person other than the corporation and its servants or agents to have milk in its possession for sale in the city. It would have power to place the milk supply on city taxes, buy and sell milk and manufacture and sell butter, cheese, ice cream and other milk products.
