## Projected Pacific Flight Comes To Grief

### Palace Of King Alexander Target For Bombers

Short Reign Of Terror Gripped City Of Belgrade — Monarch Has Been Reported In Disfavor

BELGRADE, Jugo Slavia, May 30—The Palace of King Alexander and five other strategic spots in the Capital were bombed today. A short reign of terror gripped the city, until the police explained that the missiles were not extremely dangerous, and were intended more as a demonstration or warning. The King left "for several days rest" at Niska Vanja, it was announced.

QUEBEC, May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Premier L. A. Taschereau of Quebec said today he would seek an appeal from the judgment handed down in the Superior Court at Montreal last week by Mr. Justice deLorimer declaring ultra vires the Quebec Workmen's Compensation Act of 1928 and the commission appointed to administer the act.

### Back To Land Movement

SAINT JOHN, May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Approving a new back to the land plan as explained today by Hon. L. P. D. Tilley, Minister of Lands and Mines, members of the City Council decided to cooperate with the provincial and Dominion Governments in carrying out the project, involving payment by the city of one-third of the cost entailed.

### Drowned In Few Feet Of Water

GAGETOWN, N. B., May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Thomas Drummond, 25, was drowned in the Ottnabog stream, near Lawfield, Queen's County, while stream driving today. The water was only a few feet deep but Drummond fell between the logs on which he was standing in the middle of the stream, and apparently was struck by a log while going under water. A bruise was found on the head when the body was recovered.

### Luther Dead

MONTREAL, May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Walter E. J. Luther, who headed the Montreal Stock Exchange throughout a trying year when Great Britain departed from the gold standard and "pegged" or minimum prices were enforced to prevent a panic, died in his garage today of what is believed to have been a heart attack.

### RESIGNATION OF GERMAN CABINET

Nazis Of Adolf Hitler Hail The Resignation As A Triumph.

BERLIN, May 30. (A.P.)—Dr. Heinrich Brüning and his Cabinet stepped aside today, and the Nazis of Adolf Hitler hailed the resignation with the triumphant slogan: "Our hour has come." But when President Paul Von Hindenburg accepted the resignation of the two-year-old Cabinet there was no indication that the Fascist Hitler would step directly into power. As conferences progressed throughout the day the impression grew that the Nazis would not immediately cash in on their recent state victories, but that perhaps the next Chancellor would be a man whom they could tolerate. Then, after the Lausanne Conference on June 16, there was some talk that the Nazis might assume power—but authorities agreed this was "an-

### U.S. JAZZ BANDS BARRED

FORT ERIE, Ont., May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Six United States dance bands have been barred from Canada by immigration officers here acting under new regulations issued from Ottawa. The U. S. orchestras are forbidden to enter Canada to play even for one night.

### Several Hurt By 'Quakes

MEXICO CITY, May 30—Slight earth tremors continued to shake Mexico City today after three shocks were felt yesterday. Several persons were slightly injured. Twenty-five flimsy houses in Santa Clara and a dozen in surrounding suburbs were destroyed.

### Solo Flight To Greenland

TORONTO, May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—On a solo flight to Canada via Greenland and Iceland, James D. M. Gray, Toronto aviator, plans to take off from Great Britain about July 7 according to word received by friends here.

### Still Searching For Kidnappers

SYDNEY, N. S., May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Effective June 1, all salaries and wage rates at the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation's steel plant here will be reduced by 15 percent, according to a notice posted today. A 10 percent reduction was put into effect last fall.

### Moscow Warns The Japanese

Gov't. Organ Tells Japs To Lay Off Siberia As It Is Not A Street On Which Imperialist Robbers May Walk In Safety.

MOSCOW, May 30—The Government organ Izvestia today charged certain Japanese elements with seeking an invasion of eastern Siberia to "facilitate Japan's preparations for war against the United States by making available for the Japanese military machine the rich natural resources of Asiatic Russia."

The little boy was crossing the street and apparently turned back just as the car, driven by Miss Jean Ross, swerved in an attempt to avoid striking him. An occupant of the motor was Dr. H. B. Atlee who had the child rushed to hospital where efforts to save his life were vain.

### PLANE DROPS INTO SEA WHILE FLYER PREPARES FOR HOP

Monoplane Lone Star Piloted By Nat Browne Falls In Flames While Refueling In Preparation For Tokyo Flight — Flyers Have Narrow Escape.
