SPORTING.—A rough and tumble wrestling match was staged after the regular performance at the Academy of Music on Monday, between two American worthies, rotating under the choice nom de plume of "Hail Montana, of New York, and John Kilonis, of Boston, says a St. John exchange. Just what championship belt these artists are battling for is designated when it is considered that they wandered so far from their native hamlets to this great metropolitan to settle the ownership. They had died each other in rough fashion on the stage and gave every appearance that they were struggling for a world's victory. If they were it, champion for he won the bout. Travelling westward to the next morning they were as chummy as long lost brothers, and seemed well satisfied with the gate won in New Glasgow.

PROMINENT MAN DEAD.—One of the most prominent agriculturists of King's County, passed away Monday, already referred to in The Guardian, in the person of Frederick George Boyver, of "Broadlands," Georgetown Royalty, about three miles from Georgetown.—His death came very suddenly as he was able to be out and around the previous Saturday, when he drove to Georgetown. On Sunday he was seized with the illness which terminated fatally. The late Mr. Boyver, died on February 1st, 1842, at Bunbury, Lot 48, on the old family homestead, which originally comprised 2,000 acres. He was a son of the late Stephen Boyver, whose father, John Boyver, was an ardent United Empire Loyalist, who immigrated to Prince Edward Island from Rhode Island during the American Revolution. Fred G. Boyver received a district school education, and then took up farming as his life work. In 1872 he purchased Broadlands, containing about 200 acres. Here he carried on farming extensively and enthusiastically. For a number of years he had a specialty of breeding Shorthorn cattle, and Southdown sheep, with which he often carried off the majority of prizes at the Provincial and County exhibitions. He also went into fruit growing on a large scale, his orchard being one of the best in the province. For a time he was engaged as Fruit Inspector of this province. He was a close student of agriculture, a believer in advanced methods and a ready writer on agricultural subjects. He was a man of decided views, but square and honourable in his relations with his fellow men. He leaves to mourn a widow, daughter of the late Hon. Stewart Burns of Free-town, and one son, Chester Lowe. He was a brother of Franklin Boyver of Bunbury and Mrs. George Bremner of Charlottetown.
