



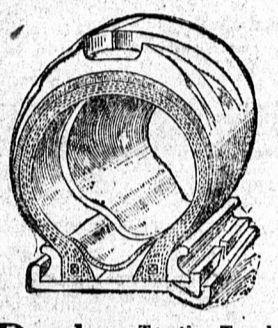

—EGG CIRCLE.—The annual meeting of the Kensington Egg Circle, No. 22, was held in the Temperance Hall on Friday evening with fair representation of the members present. Mr. W. J. Walker occupied the chair, and R. A. J. Brown acted as secretary. The minutes of the meeting held about a year ago, at which the Circle was inaugurated were read and adopted. The chairman then called upon the manager Mr. John Hogg to give his report of the years work. The report was as follows: There were 107 members in the Circle from whom had been collected \$30 as membership fees. There had been shipped 10,537 dozen of eggs for which was received \$2739.30cts. The members received after all expenses were paid \$2501.10cts. The average gross price received was 26cts. and the average net price paid to members was 24 1-3 cts. After some discussion the report was adopted. A discussion dealing with some phases of the past year's work and the outlook for the coming season was then indulged in and all expressed themselves well satisfied with the work done. A committee was then appointed to nominate seven directors for this year. The following were the choice of the committee: Messrs. W. J. Walker; W. G. Simpson; A. J. Brown; Isaac Lowther; W. Caseley; G. E. Brown; Joseph McLellan. Mr. W. J. Walker was appointed as representative to a meeting of delegates from the different Circles to be held in Charlottetown on March 17th, to consider the question of establishing a central egg-candling point. At present the Kensington Circle employs its own candler. Mr. Benson was to have been at this meeting but he was prevented on account of illness. At the close of the meeting it was unanimously agreed that an expression of appreciation to the part of this Egg Circle of the good work being done by Mr. Benson should be forwarded to the Department of Agriculture.—K.
