RELIGIOUS SERVICES

CHRISTIAN CHURCH

An impressive Lord's Day morning service was held in the Central Christian Church upon the return of the regular minister and his wife the Rev. S. C. Cooper and Mrs. Cooper. A prayer of thanksgiving was offered before the Communion service for the new turn of events in Europe which otherwise would have involved the whole world in war.

The sermon was on "Loyal Cross Bearing", James and John in the times of difficulty Jesus was going through just before the forsaking and denying and betraying the Man of Galilee said they would take the cup and be baptized with Christ's baptism. Jesus baptism was the baptism of the Cross. Every man has his cross to bear. One man in Europe bore the cross of peace in the midst of militarism and the spirit of war. Peace triumphed but what would it have meant to this messenger of peace if his mission had failed? He would have lost prestige and love and honor. We all have a cross and for our own good and the good of the church. We may shrink from the cross of war, but we must be faithful and carry our cross. Let us bring to men the message of peace and not fail as individuals and as a church.

A number of suitable hymns were sung by the choir and congregation and Miss Margaret McKay sang a solo at the morning service while Miss Helen Wood rendered a violin number which preceded an inspiring message given by the evening service on the "Crisis of the Cross."
