IN MEMORIAM

JAMES FORSYTH

The death occurred on April 26th, of Mr. James Forsyth at the home of his son, Mr. Allan Forsyth, Charlottetown. The deceased was born near Alberton on November 18th, 1827 and up to eighteen months ago, lived on the farm on which Elmsdale station is built. Being in his 8th year he was one of the oldest residents in the vicinity of Alberton, most of the companions of his younger days, having come to join the great majority. He took an active interest in all public questions of the day, and up to the time of his death took a special interest in the war, often expressing the wish that he would live to see its end. To him death had no terrors, and he certainly proved to those who were with him in his last days, that death had lost its sting for him. The funeral was held from the Presbyterian church at Elmsdale, and although the day was stormy and the roads almost impassable, the church was filled by friends, both Catholic and Protestant. The service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. Lockhart, assisted by the Rev. Geo. Miller of Alberton. Mr. Lockhart preached from the text "As a man thinketh in his heart so is he." Interment took place in the Elmsdale cemetery, beside his wife who predeceased him three years ago. He leaves to mourn, two sons, Allan, of Charlottetown, and William of Vancouver, B. C. and three daughters, Mrs. H. T. Matthews, Surprise, Sask.; Mrs. (Rev.) F. H. Larkin, Seatonville, Ont.; and Mrs. W. A. Murray, West Somerville, Mass., also three brothers and one sister, John in Alberton, Ebenezer in Elmsdale, William in Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. Alex Forsyth, Elmsdale.

AUTO REGULATIONS.—A largely attended meeting of members of the Automobile Association, merchants and others, was held in the Board of Trade Rooms last night with Mr. R. H. Sterns in the chair. Draft regulations for the running of automobiles at great length and ultimately adopted and ordered to be submitted to the Government. The principal regulation prohibits the running of automobiles on Sundays between 9.30 a. m. and 1 p. m., and 6 p. m. and 9 p. m. This is in the interest of people who wish to attend church with teams. Another regulation was the following: "Outside of the city limits we will stop our cars in every case when meeting a team and if necessary, get out of our car, and assist the driver of the team to get by in safety."

THE WEDDING CALLED OFF.—Mystery surrounds the recall yesterday of the wedding invitations of Miss Jean Krey Miller, a Vassar graduate and Professor L. L. which presented themselves as impossible barriers, but time which brought with it experience in the management of our homes has shown us what can be accomplished, and we are proud of the showing, proud of the experience, and proud of the accomplishments.

We have seen tiny tots taken within the walls and nursed and cared for until youth was attained. We have seen the necessary training applied to the youth by loving hands and kindly hearts ever mindful of the lone position of the needy one. The training bore fruit and by the continued exercise of patience the youth was prepared for a higher stage in life. Today we find our homes turning out boys and girls who after a period of careful training are able to go out in the world fitted for a contact with life, which enables them to earn their own living and be independent.
