**THE CALEDONIAN SPORTS.**  
Already much interest is being aroused in the forthcoming national sports under the auspices of the Caledonian Club which are scheduled to take place during Old Home Week in the afternoon of Wednesday, July 26 at the grounds of the Amateur Athletic Association. These sports mark the crowning athletic competition of the year in Prince Edward Island and are always keenly contested by gallant competitors. While distinctly Scottish in flavor, and designed to keep alive the national spirit among the descendants of Old Scotia a number of the events will be open to all, including throwing the hammer, putting the stone, the pole vault and the running long jump. Two events, the 220 yards and quarter mile races will be contested by members of the A. A. Association.  
The Boys Highland Brigade will also have two races set apart for them. So there will be something for all, old and young of whatever nationality. But as we have said the flavor and spirit of the day will be distinctly Scottish. The Highland Fling will afford separate competition in skill in grace for girls, boys and men respectively. The sword dance will be again, as it always is, an engaging feature. And there will be the music of the pipes, "which instills the stirring

memory of a thousand years." It promises to be a great day, and a great gathering of athletes and their admirers from all parts of the Island. For the Caledonians always do these things well and the reputation of their sports in the past has been so well established and maintained that no admirer of athletics can afford to miss the annual gathering.

**A BRIEF HISTORY OF CANADA.**  
A History of Canada, designed for use in schools by the pupils beginning the study of history, has been compiled by Dr. George U. Hay and published by the Copp Clark Company of Toronto. About 100 pages are devoted to the recital of the principal events in the annals of Canada from the first discovery of the country down to the present time. To this is added some 25 pages sketching the history of Prince Edward Island, and written by Miss Helen M. Anderson of this city.  
The entire work is an admirable one of its class. The historian has succeeded in touching in a lucid manner and with some degree of fulness those events which stand out with boldness in our history. Instead of a compilation of facts strung together for the purpose of getting everything in, the book is prepared to give the young student an intelligent idea of our country as a whole and the chief features of its story in a manner calculated to arouse an interest and induce further study.  
A number of outline maps, and the pronunciation of the more different names are minor features of the book which will aid both the teacher and the pupil in their work. We know of no other volume covering the same ground which gives more information in such concise and readable form. We cheerfully commend the book to the favorable notice of the Board of Education and to the teachers in our public schools.

**RENEWING THE CONTRACT.**  
Elsewhere in this issue of The Guardian will be found the amended proposition for gas and electric lighting submitted by the Light and Power Company and accepted by the City Council on Saturday subject to the approval of the citizens. If so approved the terms will be embodied in a new contract to take effect when the present contract shall expire. The agreement reached is a compromise, and there will doubtless be wide differences of opinion as to the wisdom of accepting it. There are some things to be said in its favor. The Light Company are now giving a much improved service as compared with the past, and promise further improvement. They make some reduction in their rates. If no renewal of the contract had been agreed upon the City would be compelled to purchase or build a new plant, to be operated by the City Council. To this method of management many even of the friends of municipal ownership are squarely opposed. Under all the circumstances we think the majority of our citizens will endorse the renewal of the contract on the terms proposed.
