ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

The City of Wheat arrived last night at eleven o'clock from Halifax with a general cargo.

The Princess arrived last night at a quarter to nine and the express at a quarter after.

At the Sussex races on Wednesday, Rookfarm Grace 2.19½ owned by J. R. Cowans, Springhill won the Free for All.

In the first stage of the King's match at Blisley the Canadians did remarkably well. Capt Jones made a score of 59 out of 70.

The S. S. Polino, of the Dobell Line, will sail from Montreal on July 25th for Summerside, Charlottetown and St. John.

The Fourth Regiment Band will play in the Gardens this evening. It is expected that Worth's Band will play on Tuesday night.

Rev. W. B. Hinson, of San Diego, Cal., and well known in Charlottetown, has received, but declined a call to First Church, San Francisco.

Mrs. BALDERSTON and children have returned from Prince Edward Island and will reside here. They are at present the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Drake.—Regina Standard.

WHILE on a visit to New Brunswick a few weeks ago Dr. J. H. Ayers secured some excellent photographs of points of interest on the St. John and forks of the Miramichi Rivers.

Owing to the wet weather yesterday the garden party under the auspices of the Ladies Auxiliary of Y. M. C. A. was not held. The public are invited to visit the Y. M. C. A. rooms this evening when the refreshments will be disposed of.

The year's shooting of the Provincial Rifle Association takes place on Wednesday and Thursday, Aug. 22nd and 23rd. The matches will be on much the same lines as last year, with the addition of a Consolation Match for those who do not win anything in any of the others.

WHEN Dr. Carman was passing through St. John, he said to a reporter, that there was a period of active work ahead for the Church in the Maritime Provinces, and he was glad to learn of enthusiasm of the people in relation to the extension of the Ladies' College Building at Mount Allison.

The Star's Blisley cable says later returns in the competition for Rajah Kola-pore's cup, give the Canadian team 20 additional points at the first range (200 yards). These increase the score from 267 to 287. Canada has in consequence won the cup by a majority of two points over Australia, their aggregates being 773 and 771 respectively.

At a convention of the Liberal Conservatives of the First District of Queen's at Bradshaw's yesterday, the nomination was offered to William Campbell, Sea View and E. Boswell, Victoria. As Mr. Boswell would not give a decided answer the convention adjourned to meet at a later date. The present members are Hon. George W. Simpson and Matthew Smith, Hampton.

A MEETING of Christ Church vestry at Dartmouth was held last evening. The resignation of J. L. Wilson, who has for a number of years held the position of vestry clerk, was accepted. Mr. Wilson will be unable to fill the duties of that office, having accepted a position as traveller for the Maritime Packing Company of Charlottetown. A meeting of the vestrymen will be held at 8.30 tomorrow evening to appoint a successor to Mr. Wilson.—Halifax Ex.

While in the city he was the guest of his niece, Mrs. Chester McLure, Pleasant Street. The Doctor is one of our very successful Islanders. He has been practising for thirteen years in Waltham, where he has won the confidence of the people and the honor of his profession.

A HALIFAX despatch says:—Friends in this city of Rev. Principal Gordon of Queen's College, Kingston, to-night presented an address, accompanied by a very handsome gold watch and chain. The chair was occupied by Rev. President Forrest of Dalhousie College. Among those who made speeches were representatives of St. Andrew's church, Halifax, and the Presbyterian College, Halifax. Rev. Dr. Gordon made a touching reply.

THE appeal case of the Dominion Packing Company from the city assessment was being heard at the city court yesterday and was adjourned till Saturday. The property of the company from which appeal is made is assessed as follows: real estate \$47,100, personal property \$34,000. J. M. Wiley, manager of the company, claims a very large reduction. The witnesses examined yesterday were Samuel Lowe, J. M. Wiley, W. G. Haddlessey and Bruce Stewart. The assessors were not present and the magistrate stated that he would bring their absence to the notice of the City Council. Among the other important cases are the Charlottetown Light and Power Company who also ask for a large reduction from their assessment.

He has worked through all the various departments and understands every detail of the business.
