In a driving northeast gale that swept the Nova Scotia and Newfoundland coast during the past two weeks the schooner Jubilee, owned by Captain John Dicks, of Georgetown, P. E. I., a brother of Capt. Ed. Dicks, of St. Pierre-Glas Bay smuggling fame, was caught a week ago and came nearly going to the bottom with all on board. At the time the vessel was in charge of Capt. John Lake, as Capt. Dicks was sick in the hospital in St. Pierre and was loaned from this port to the French colony with a cargo of coal. How the vessel survived the storm is something bordering on the miraculous. Tossed about in a useless condition with her jumbo foresail, foremast and mainboom and dory washed away, I looked to the crew as if it were her last voyage. However, for several hours all hands worked like trojans, and endeavored to get the vessel to St. Lawrence, when a message was sent here, Captain Ed. Dicks left at once for St. Pierre and will look after the repairs to the damaged craft. The loss to the Georgetown skipper will amount to at least \$700, and as the vessel was only insured against total loss, Captain Dicks will be out about \$1,000.—Sydney Ex.

sight of something repulsive, would have been a source of great concern. The valvular action was normal from an eye examination. The four valves were comparatively good. I would say they were not gravely incompetent. One cusp of the mitral valve was somewhat more reddened than usual. The cusps of the aortic valve were in very fair condition. The valves did not show evidence of organic valvular disease. The water test was applied to show the efficiency or otherwise of the cusps of the valve.

The cusps reacted well; their edges approximated. In my opinion in life there was not very much seriously the matter with the valve. The water leaked through in the test to a slight extent. The test was not made under normal pressure. I did not attach importance to the leakage of water in the test. From the condition of
