ATTEMPT MADE ON HITLER'S LIFE

British Navy To 'Break Hearts' Of German Raiders

Churchill Speaks With More Assurance Of Definite Mastery Over U-Boats.

LONDON, Nov. 8 (CP)—Perseverance in the fight against German U-boats and surface raiders will be the royal navy's "break their hearts" strategy, Churchill said today.

Without in any way minimizing the dangers inherent in the enemy's use of the first lord declared he could "now repeat with more assurance what I told the House under much reserve six weeks ago—that we are gaining a definite mastery over the U-boat attack."

He estimated Germany could build new submarines at the rate of two weekly and added that "the sound conservative estimate" of the rate the British navy could destroy them was "between two and four every week."

It is believed Germany had about 60 U-boats ready for action at the declaration of war and Mr. Churchill told the House the admiralty believed that in January Germany would have 100 subma-

Announcing the result of the investigation into the sinking of the Royal Oak by a German U-boat, Mr. Churchill told the House it had been determined that "neither physical obstructions nor patrolling access to Scapa Flow" nor "patrolling craft were in that state of strength and efficiency required to make the loss of the vessel a complete proof, as it should have been against the attack of a submarine."

Peace Plans Hopes Dwindle

THE HAGUE, Nov. 8 (CP)—Hope of success for the war mediation offer of Queen Wilhelmina of the Netherlands and King Leopold of Belgium dwindled to almost nothing tonight, informed Dutch sources said after Adolf Hitler ignored it in his speech at the Munich conference.

LONDON, Nov. 8—Mr. Churchill told the House today that the aircraft carrier Ark Royal, which he said German radio reports "have sunk so many times," recently had taken one of its most valuable war prizes captured by the Royal Navy.

TORONTO, Nov. 8—Work has been started at Taplow, Buckinghamshire, on Canada's first military hospital in England, it was announced tonight by the Canadian Red Cross which is financing its construction and equipment.

QUEBEC, Nov. 8—Quebec Province's 20th cabinet since Confederation—the 14-man Liberal ministry of Premier Adolphe Godbout took the oath of office today at the Legislature buildings.

NEW WATERFORD, N. S., Nov. 8 (CP)—Two employees of Dominion Coal Company's No. 12 colliery here died today of injuries suffered in separate accidents in the pit.

Planes, Sub-chasers Ammunition, Gun-barrels Basis Of Orders In Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 (CP)—Aircraft anti-submarine boats, ammunition and gun barrels will form the basis of initial orders to be placed in Canada by the British supply board, Lieut.-Col. J. H. M. Greenly, controller-general, told the Canadian Press today.

Col. Greenly was not in a position to estimate the volume of business these orders would bring but said it would be heavy.

The purchase of the British supply board was announced yesterday in London and Ottawa to co-ordinate buying in both Canada and the United States. Sir James Rae who came to Canada as part of the original British mission a month ago, will be deputy controller-general.

Clear Lane Along Border To Halt Spies

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 (CP)—Increasing precautions against smugglers, aliens, saboteurs or spies coming over the Quebec-Maine section of the international border, the Canadian Government is clearing a 20-foot lane along the 300-mile stretch of bushland and scrub.

Dr. Manion Urges Tribute To Heroic Dead

OTTAWA, Nov. 8 (CP)—Condemning the leader Manion said tonight in a poppy day fund message that "we must not forget to pause and pay tribute to our heroic dead who gave their lives in that last great struggle which as time has shown, was but the prelude to this final fight against tyranny, injustice and persecution."

International At A Glance

Diplomats See Nazis Seeking Invasion Pretext

LONDON, Nov. 8—British diplomatic quarters reported tonight they had learned from an impeccable source that Germany had set out to frighten Belgium and the Netherlands by first massing troops on their borders and then spreading rumors throughout the neutral capitals of the world that a new Reich invasion was due.

This disclosure it was stated threw a new light on the Belgian-Netherlands peace appeal. Diplomats believed the Nazi propaganda strategy was aimed either at bringing about the action taken by the two rulers or at provoking some gesture by the Allies or the low countries which would furnish a pretext for armed German attack.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 8 (CP)—Sudden relaxation of the campaign against Belgium and the Netherlands in the German press was noted today by a foreign office spokesman who expressed the opinion that the mediation offer of King Leopold and Queen Wilhelmina had gained its point.

French Repulse Nazi Thrusts Near Apach

PARIS, Nov. 8 (AP)—German thrusts in three newly active western front sectors, each made by at least a full company, have been repulsed by machine-gun fire, the French command reported tonight.

PRO-GERMANS IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 8 (CP)—The reactionary pro-German propaganda group covered the walls of Mexico City today with placards calling for the "return" of British Honduras to Mexico or Guatemala.

Nazi Leader Missed Death By Few Minutes

Gandhi Sees No Solution But Free India

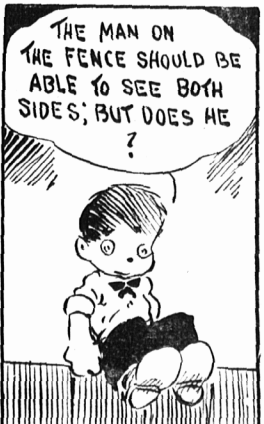
