United Church Presbytery

The United Church Presbytery meeting in Hearts Hall in quarterly session Tuesday heard and approved calls to the pastoral charge of Wellington, Sheffield, N.E. of New Richmond, Quebec, in favor of Rev. Mr. Vincent, Rev. James Cross and Rev. Dr. Murray. Presbytery nominated Rev. Dr. Kerr of Dalhousie for the office of Moderator of the United Church of Canada. Rev. Mr. Skinner and Mr. Leonard Cudmore were named as commissioners to general council. A special meeting of Presbytery will be called to discuss the possibility of having two Presbyteries in the province instead of one as at present.

MORNING

Presbytery opened with a worship service conducted by Rev. Mr. Skinner. Routine correspondence and reports of special and standing committees were heard. Rev. Mr. Green, speaking for the committee on Missionary Education and Overseas Work, said in part: "We have great reason to be proud of our missionaries. No soldier has shown greater loyalty to duty than they. Mr. Green asked the question 'Is our Christianity worth exporting? If not, we must make it so.' He urged upon his fellow Presbyteries the need of continued prayer, call to world-wide repentance and more sacrificial giving to the missionary enterprise. Rev. Edward MacVicar asked all ministers who completed a change in pastoral relations this year to exercise the greatest possible care in bringing communicant rolls and other church records up to date. It was announced that medical examinations will be compulsory for all persons seeking marriage licenses. This legislation is an indication that the question of public health is receiving the thoughtful consideration of the Government of the Province. On motion the Presbytery adjourned to meet again after the noon hour.

AFTERNOON

The opening moments of the afternoon session were devoted to a report to Presbytery of the chairman of the Pension Fund capital campaign. Worthwhile progress was reported. An enthusiastic vote of thanks was given to Mr. Percy Turner for his pleasing presentation of his report, and for his untiring efforts to carry out a campaign through to a successful conclusion. Rev. Austin Jardine announced the following schedule of summer camps: Young People, July 2-9; girls, July 10-18; boys, July 23-30. All camps will be under M.R.E. C. auspices with a staff of capable leaders drawn from all cooperating churches. The lay association reported substantial contributions to the Murray fund and the fund to aid needy theological students. Mr. Brooks announced that Tryon has been chosen for the annual meeting of the Lay Association. A definite date for July will be announced shortly for this gathering. The pastoral relations committee announced that prospects are bright that the vacancies which now exist in Richmond Bay East, Bradairene, West Cape Breton, also are to be filled shortly. In the interim Winslow and West Cape will each have student supply. Mr. Eldon Gunn is student minister at Bellefleur. He was present at the sessions and was invited to sit and correspond. Some discussion took place as to the attitude of Presbytery toward men who are not engaged in pastoral work but whose names continue to remain on the roll of Presbytery. Mr. Skinner said in view of the shortage of ministers these men should be urged to return to the active pastorate. He said the church needs every minister in his place. The place of every minister is in the active pastorate. It was suggested that other Presbyteries, however, that the men not engaged in pastoral duties no doubt could furnish satisfactory reasons for not being engaged. Also they have no claim on the pension fund and, too, are within their rights when asking to have their names retained. A request from one of the ordinands to be given leave of absence for post-graduate study was also heard. This also evoked lively discussion. The committee on education and students announced the name of John Malcolm MacLeod of Valleyfield as a candidate for the ministry. Reports were also heard on the academic studies and summer appointments of other students. Messrs. Jordan, Blair, Robson and MacKay. Plans were made to receive Melburne McDowell as a licentiate at a public worship in the local church on May 28. A similar service will be held for Eddie Leard in Beckville, Conference Week. Rev. Lewis Murray made the following recommendations as a consequence of maintenance and missions: (a) send in contributions regularly, (b) encourage formation of local committees for prayer, study and sacrificial giving, (c) encourage stewardship through sermons, essays and in other ways. Rev. Mr. MacLennan, who was reported for Evangelical and Social Service, referring to the starvation conditions in Europe, said: "The hunger must be fed, not only for humanitarian reasons but also to prevent race suicide." Referring to the liquor problem he said that "in a hungry world, the money spent on what is not bread has reached serious proportions." He referred to the meeting of the committee in Toronto which recommended that "food controls be continued and strengthened." Rev. George Gough, chairman of Presbytery announced that an itinerary was being arranged for the forthcoming visit of Rev. Mr. Worr of the Leeds Day Alliance. On completion of the full agenda of business the meeting adjourned to meet in Beckville at the close of the first session of Conference on June 11th.
