SOMETHING WRONG IN ONTARIO.

Ontario suffers from two great evils, a low birthrate and a heavy infant mortality. The birthrate is 22.1. It is lower than any of the European countries; lower even than Rhode Island or Connecticut, and by the merest fraction higher than the rate in Vermont, and New Hampshire. This is bad enough in all conscience.

At the same time the infant mortality in Ontario is high. Of the 48,712 infants born in Ontario in the last year for which we have statistics, 6,700 died in their first year of life. An additional 1,931 died before attaining their fifth year. That is, one in eight died in the first year, and one in six died before attaining the age of five years.

It is true that in England the infantile deathrate is very slightly higher than in Ontario, but there are obvious causes there which do not exist in the Canadian Province—the intense crowding of the masses, the prevalent drunkenness among parents, and the number employed in factory labor. The people of Ontario are largely an agricultural population and comparatively well-to-do.

The comparison as to both the birth rate and infant mortality as compared with England is, under the circumstances, decidedly against Ontario. The cause of these conditions is probably, as John Burns said it is in England, not so much due to inhumanity as to neglect, thoughtlessness and ignorance.

We have not the means of knowing as yet how Prince Edward Island compares with Ontario in regard to these vital points. The Vital Statistics Act now just gone into force will afford the material in a short time to come. We have reason to think that infant mortality in Prince Edward Island will be found to compare favorably with other Provinces, but that the birthrate is lower than it ought to be. This is, however largely a conjecture.

Syracuse, N. Y. is now utilizing electric power from Niagara Falls, 150 miles distant.

As far as can be known at present the dreadful railway disaster on July 1 at Salisbury, England, was due to reckless speed around a dangerous curve. The regular speed of the train was about a mile a minute, with instructions to the driver not to exceed thirty miles while rounding Salisbury curve. Drivers who have to make high speed are reluctant to lose their headway, and it is believed that the curve was taken at a much higher speed than thirty miles.

Governor McKinnon appears to have made a capital impression by his address before the Summer School of Science at Sydney.

The Sunday Observance Bill has at last passed the Commons, and although it has been made less stringent by amendments, Rev. Mr. Shearer, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance believes the measure will still be productive of much good.

Eighteen years ago the system of free passages on railways was declared by Congress to be illegal. The New York Times says "the individuals who passed that statute, the President who signed it and most Congressmen and Presidents since their ignored the law." The Times quotes an estimate that at a recent date there were on America railways 200,000 free passages taken daily, or say about 70,000,000 annually.

The Guardian's publication of a list of Eminent Islanders, twenty in number, elected by the votes of readers of this Journal, has attracted wide interest within this Province and has been reproduced abroad. As in the case of almost every election, some comment has been made and regret expressed that good men were left out. It should be remembered, however, that the way to eminence has not been barred by the election just held. The road is wide open yet to honor and fame the same as before.

The Toronto Globe says "there is absolutely no justification for any department at Ottawa buying Canadian goods through an alien firm of middlemen and paying a commission greater probably than the manufacturer's profits. This is not business, and the people of Canada will not stand for it." These are brave words and just, but that sort of thing has gone on for some years past, and we fear that even the terrors of a five-line paragraph in The Globe will not stop it. Graft is no longer timid in Canada. It sits in the seats of the mighty. If The Globe had the courage of its strength it would seize the grafters with gauntlets of iron and squeeze and shake them till they would cry for mercy.

Of course, it is easy to see how a Senator with a life pension of \$2,500 a year conditioned only upon a brief attendance at the sessions, would not willingly submit his good fortune to a vote of the people or of the Legislature. The Senators have a good thing as it is and they want to "stand pat." It is not to the Senate we must look for Senate reform. The Senators each have 2,500 good reasons renewable from year to year, for keeping the Senate in its present shape. And yet the change will come.

THE AGAMEMNON

A GRAND SHIP

GLASGOW, Scotland, July 7.—The British battleship Agamemnon, of 16,300 tons, was successfully launched here and was named by the Countess of Aberdeen.

Among the novelties in the construction of the ship are the following:—All her guns will be above the upper deck and her heavy guns will be more concentrated in the centre of the vessel, while the smaller pieces will be carried on a central platform deck, extending about one-third the length of the ship and upward of thirty feet above the water line, giving great command on all sides of the water round the ship.

P.E. Island Pharmaceutical Association

The board of examiners of the P. E. Island Pharmaceutical Association will meet for the purpose of examining candidates offering for registration on July 30, 1906.
