Daily War Survey

(By The Canadian Press) Tension in Holland arising out of suspicions of German intentions towards that peaceful Kingdom eased somewhat as the weekend passed but the second Great War remained essentially a war of words. Actually there has been no sustained military effort directed towards an obvious objective since German and Russian troops completed the subjugation of Poland.

While the warring nations in the west mark time and German plans remain wrapped in the obscurity of inaction, Soviet Russia continues its pressure on Finland. Publication in an official Russian newspaper of a demand for a slice of Finnish territory in the north adjacent to the Soviet port of Murmansk gave a new turn to the month-old negotiations between the two countries.

As the Russian press is strictly controlled, it is safe to assume that what Soviet newspapers say today has already been said by the government or will be said shortly. Thus the Russians appear to be gradually raising the ante in the Finnish negotiations while the Finns claim they have gone as far as they can in meeting Russian demands.
