CAPT. OLAND IN COMMAND.—No. 2 Section, 4th Divisional Ammunition Column now being formed at Halifax is commanded by captain C. C. Oland who some years ago resided in Charlottetown. Captain S. C. Oland served two years as private in the 82nd P.E.I. regiment and the same period in the P.E.I. Light Horse. He obtained a commission in the first C. G. A. in 1904 and is a qualified field artillery officer. He served as gun group commander for Major Hensley in the victorious Canadian team which won the King's Cup in 1907, also in the Canadian Artillery team which went to England in 1911 and made such a splendid record in gunnery.

Rev. John A. MacDonald, P. P. Grand River, Indian Commissioner for this province, received the other day the letter given below from the Secretary of the Aborigines Protection Society, London, England. The letter speaks for itself and shows the fatherly interest taken by the Society in the Indians of Canada. It shows also, incidentally, the good work that is being done by "Father John A." who never neglects an opportunity to help his Indian wards and in seventeen from the Lennox Island Reserve are now wearing the King's uniform. Following is the letter referred to:

London, S. W., May 9th, 1916.

Dear Sir:—It was a pleasure to us to see Bombardier J. Sark who called at this office last week with the introduction which you kindly gave him. We had a talk with him and invited him to come to our Committee Meeting last week.

Bradford King and John Power were arrested last night charged with drunkenness and reckless driving on the streets. It is stated that Mr. Brown was coming out of La Grand Cafe, Queen Street, when he was hailed by one of these men, who asked for the loan of \$1.50 which Mr. Brown gave to him. Some talk ensued between Mr. Brown and King, the latter appearing in a fighting mood. Mr. Brown told him he did not wish to have anything to do with him, but the latter persisting, Mr. Brown was forced to take measure to defend himself and started to take off his overcoat. This is all he remembers till he found himself in the hospital. His injuries consist of his right leg broken in two places, his head badly smashed and his body bruised.

The death occurred at Atlantic, Mass. on the 13th inst., of Miss Selton Nickerson, daughter of Mrs. John McIntosh, Port Hill. Mrs. Nickerson, had been in poor health for several months but the news of her death was a surprise to her many friends in Port Hill and elsewhere as they did not know the end was so near. Mrs. Nickerson was greatly loved and respected where she resided as was shown by the large number who attended the funeral and by the floral tributes sent by the following:—Wreath from Neighbors; Wreath, Husband's Relatives; Spray, John and Helena McIntosh; Spray, Mrs. Arthur Large; Spray Miss Emma McArthur; Wreath from Sunday School; a sorrowing husband Mrs. Nickerson leaves to mourn a family of five children, a sister Mrs. Bailey of Duxbury, Mass; and her aged mother and a brother and a brother Mr. James McIntosh at Port Hill.
