**THE GOVERNOR GENERAL.**

Despite official statements which have been taken by some persons as evasions and by others as qualified denials, the impression remains that Lord Minto and his constitutional advisers do not see eye to eye in all particulars. It has been said that there has been "no friction," but that does not necessarily mean that a full accord exists. It is said that Lord Minto has a very strong will; that before coming to Canada he had some friction with his advisers in Australia, and brought about their downfall; that in military matters in Canada he has held very exalted views of his own prerogatives; that he supported the pretensions of General Hutton to the effect that the control of our permanent military forces and the militia was a matter wholly of imperial concern, and that the functions of the Canadian Government and Parliament began and ended with finding the men and the money.

When the trial of strength came General Hutton had to go, but this did not bring about any better accord between Lord Minto and his advisers. The Royal visit is said to have widened the rift. Report has it that there were differences of opinion between the Governor and his advisers in regard to the general program and itinerary of the Royal Pair, and that in this the Government mainly had its own way only by insistence, while in regard to the recommendations for imperial honors Lord Minto had one list, the Ministers another, and because they could not agree the honors were limited to a very few. Such are a few of the alleged grounds of the alleged non-accord between Lord Minto and his Cabinet, which have led to the rumors of the Governor General's recall. It seems not improbable that where there was so much smoke there was at least some heat if not a portion of fire as well.

The one point most discussed in regard to the alleged difference and friction has been that of the recommendations for imperial honors. In the United Kingdom the Ministry of the day is always responsible for honors and titles conferred by the King. Why should not the King's Privy Council for Canada be in the same manner responsible for titular honors bestowed in Canada? Or, to put it in another way, how can the Governor General personally in Canada assume a power or prerogative in regard to the conferring of Knighthood such as the King himself would not assume in the United Kingdom.

It is not unlikely that when Parliament meets some light may be thrown upon the matters here referred to. The relations between the Governor General and his Cabinet are in the main private and confidential, but it seems not improbable that there may have been communications between Ottawa and the Colonial Office in regard to some of these matters which Parliament could bring into light if thought desirable. In any case the people of Canada will sympathize with the effort of the Ministers to retain a full control of Canadian affairs by and for the people of the Dominion.

**SIDEWALKS NEEDED.**  
The very large traffic across the ferry to and from Southport ought to be a sufficient warrant to the Street Committee to have the roadway and sidewalks connection between the boat landing and Water Street in the best possible condition. Unfortunately this is not and has not been the case. There is not and has not been any sidewalk connection between Water Street and the ferry approach. It is true a sidewalk extends down the west side of Prince Street for a short distance nearly to the railway crossing, but foot passengers have to pick their way as best they can through the mud from the end of this walk to the ferry approaches.

The sidewalks on the ferry wharf have been usually twisted and uneven, and frequently left for long periods in a more or less dangerous condition. But nothing can excuse the want of a complete footwalk from the ferry landing up to Water Street. We are now in the midst of the muddy season, which will last for probably a month to come. The spring months are also muddy months. Therefore this work should be attended to at once, alike in the interest of the large numbers of both city and country people who utilize this thoroughfare.

Smallpox in the United States in Western Provinces, in St. John and Halifax and in Newfoundland should move our health authorities to take every precaution against its making an inroad here. The situation in St. John appears to be quite grave indeed. There is a general Public Hospital there, and an Epidemic, or Contagious Diseases Hospital near by. A smallpox patient was sent to the Epidemic Hospital and died there. In a dwelling near by another case developed supposed to be infected from the Epidemic Hospital. Worse still, two nurses in the Public Hospital were attacked, and thereupon that large institution was placed in quarantine. Now an Emergency Hospital has to be created for the medical and surgical cases which call for hospital care from time to time. This is a loud call to Charlottetown to be prepared.
