Boys' Parliament At Mt. Stewart

The second Boys' Parliament directed by the Prince Edward Island Boys' Work Board was held on Friday and Saturday in Mount Stewart. The Premier, Mr. Clarence Christy of Bonshaw and the leader of the Opposition was Murray Creed of Bridgetown. The Lieutenant Governor was Rev. W. T. Mercer of Mount Stewart, while the speaker was Rev. L. M. Murray of Hunter River. The clerk, Rev. I. Judson Levy of Charlottetown, as secretary of the Boys' Work Board directed the Parliament.

Friday evening twenty-one boys assembled in the United Church hall. After supper, plans for the session of the Parliament were completed, parties were formed and procedure outlined.

Two sessions of the Parliament were held on Saturday. Resolutions and recommendations were introduced and debated, sometimes with considerable vigour. Party caucuses were held. Government and opposition were led by Mr. Murray and Rev. R. E. Vessey. Opposition advisors were Rev. R. E. Shaw and Rev. W. T. Mercer.

Parliament endorsed the boys' camps and asked the boys to use their influence to get others to attend. All Tuxis and Trail Rangers were urged to enter the national athletic contest. Financing the Maritime Religious Education Council by share selling or other means was also discussed and the Maritime Tuxis Parliament was asked to increase the allotment to Prince Edward Island. Emphasis was placed on the Tuxis and Trail Ranger work as a church-related programme, and on the need for loyalty and for the organization of new groups.

Hand Work Display At St. Joseph's Convent

The annual handwork and cooking display of the pupils of Rochford Square school, which opened Saturday morning, has attracted hundreds of citizens over the week end. The exhibition will remain open to the public until this evening. It is to be seen in St. Joseph's Convent.

A wide variety of useful articles the work of the pupils is included in the display. Many favorable comments on the outstanding skill shown by the pupils have been heard from the large number of interested parents, relatives and friends who have already visited the convent.

From the youngest to the oldest pupil their work shows marked ability. The progress of the various grades is amply demonstrated in the articles which show great improvement as the higher grades are reached.

One hour's regular instruction is given to the pupils each week. So great is the enthusiasm for this branch of their studies that many of the ambitious pupils come early and stay late to perfect or complete articles on which they are working.

Nearness of taste and attention to detail are very pronounced even in the work of the tiny tots, whose display includes class work books, and drawings which are exemplary models.

Sewing, knitting, weaving, embroidery, work, darning, patching, drawing, cooking, painting, etc., are included in this exhibition at which there are several hundred articles.

Included among the exhibits are several pieces which will be donated to the Red Cross. Among these are hemmed handkerchiefs, sweaters and other knitted articles for refugees, children, seamen's scarves, and a lovely dinner and supper tablecloth.

A sand table demonstration by the pupils of Grade Nine showing the various battle fronts and theatres of war is an interesting study in current events.

That nutrition has been a subject that has received much careful study is shown by the model breakfast, dinner and supper demonstrated by food cut out. Exhibits of the pupils' own cooking include tempting salads, custards, cookies, lemon pie, biscuits, bread, etc. Canned beans, soups and other vegetables that were processed last fall are also shown.

Grade one and two's contribution to the exhibit is also very interesting. Included samples of seat work, pretty aprons, drawings, cut out work, etc.

Grades three and four made the most difficult handwork scarves. Grades five and six showed their patriotism and ability by making sweaters for the refugees, a quilt for the Red Cross, as well as carefully hemmed towels, aprons and other crocheted edgings are also included in their display.

Very pretty cushions and attractive dresses, suits, etc., are also of great interest. The altar linens made by grades nine and ten are greatly admired by all the visitors and show great skill and care in the work of embroidery, etc. were also made by those older pupils.

(Continued From Page One) A F. 5's big bombers were over Germany after a two-week's lull. Dueseldorf and Muenster were targets of concentrated attacks on Friday night, when more than 2,000 tons of explosives were showered down by what was the greatest heavy bomber fleet in history.

In addition to attacking the heart of industrial Germany, the Air Ministry said the R.A.F. laid mines in enemy waters Saturday night and that fighter intruders attacked transport targets in northern France and the low countries, a daylight fighter offensive was carried out on a large scale.
