THE PANAMA AFFAIR.

The United States and Colombia were
at peace and had long been so. A treaty
was negotiated between the two Repub-
lics subject to the approval of their re-
spective Congresses by which on pay-
ment of a lump sum of ten millions of
dollars and an annual subsidy, the United
States was to obtain a right of way to
construct the Panama Canal. The Col-
ombia Congress rejected the treaty, as
it had a perfect right to do, and named a
larger purchase price and subsidy which
the United States would not pay. So
things remained until a little more than
a week ago a so-called revolution broke
out in the State of Panama, one of the
States of Columbia. United States
ships of war were sent racing to the
scene, marines were landed, and in their
presence the independence of Panama
was proclaimed.

The new Republic of Panama was at
once recognised by the Government of the
United States and Colombia was notified
of the fact. Columbia protested in vain.
In the meantime the new minister to re-
present Panama at Washington has ar-
rived in that city and been duly recog-
nised as the Plenipotentiary and Envoy
Extraordinary of the new Republic. It is
given out that a treaty will be promptly
arranged by him with Secretary Hay by
which Panama will grant the right of way
for the canal and receive the stipulated
price of ten million dollars. The Demo-
cratic opposition at Washington openly
charge that the revolution was fomented
and assisted by the United States Gov-
ernment and navy. They will move for
the official correspondence, but it is given
out by the State Department that this
will be refused. It would probably not
look well in the eyes of the world.
Thus in one short week Columbia is

deprived of a large portion of her
territory by a professedly friendly power,
and a new Republic, without organiza-
tion, without a government other than
a self-constituted, without a constitu-
tion or a legislature, is recognised as one
of the nations of the earth. Secession
was thought to be a crime in the United
States forty years ago. Secession in the
United States of Columbia is now en-
couraged and assisted by the United
States of North America, as represented
by President Roosevelt and his cabinet.
The President has evidently met with
no change of heart since the time, five
years ago when he advised that the
Spanish fleet should be attacked and
sunk while Spain and the United States
were at peace. These are "strenuous"
proceedings, but they are also treacher-
ous. The episode will serve to open the
eyes of the South American Republics
as to the real value of the professed
friendship of the Republic of the north.

FOR POLITICAL HONESTY.

Rev. Dr. Carman, Superintendent of the
Methodist Church in Canada, and Rev. S.
D. Chow, Secretary of the Conference
Committee on Temperance and Moral Re-
form, have issued to the Methodists of
Canada a manifesto in favor of purity in
elections. Most heartily do we commend
this action and trust that other religious
bodies may take action along similar lines.
So long as Christian electors will blindly
follow and support party leaders regard-
less of their public conduct so long will
corrupt and corrupting influences prevail
at the polls and in our Legislatures and
Parliament. We believe that a great re-
sponsibility rests upon the Christian
churches in this matter, and that there
lies here a duty that has been greatly
neglected in the past.

Rev. Dr. Carman and Rev. Mr. Chow
point out that political life in Canada has
sadly suffered because in elections and in
practical politics men are not influenced
by high convictions, and do not observe
that honesty of conduct which is held to
be so necessary in business life and which
is so essential to the public welfare. They
proceed:

"So long as Christians consent to follow
party lines with moral issues left out, we
cannot expect those who are most concern-
ed about getting into or keeping in power
to take up questions that will antagonize
the vicious or purchasable voters.

"The revelations of this corruption and
the bondage of party politics which makes
men condone the crimes of their own
party, and the reckless and violent de-
nunciations of the political opponents,
regardless of truth and candor, are very
humiliating to Christian citizens. The
cure for this condition cannot in the na-
ture of the case come out of political
parties as such. The remedy must be
found in the protest of the Christian
Church, and the refusal of Christian men
to tolerate moral wrong in their respec-
tive parties and to demand that the
ethics of Christianity, righteousness,
truth and purity shall characterize our
public men.

"One of the present and imperative du-
ties of the Church is to arcuse the con-
science of the people in regard to the
sacredness of the ballot, the heinousness
of selling those convictions which are
an element in manhood, and the shameful
crime involved in buying the souls of men
with the corrupting gold of the briber."

Large as has been the shrinkage of
American securities during the current
year, amounting to \$1,000,000,000, the
leading financial authorities in London
represent the shrinkage of British securi-
ties of all kinds at a figure more than
twice as great.

France has now the largest national
debt in the world—\$5,800,000,000 followed
by Russia with \$3,167,000,000 and with
Great Britain third with \$3,060,000,000.
Italy, Germany and the German States,
Spain, Australia, Austria-Hungary and
the United States are next in the order
named.

By the proposed improvement of the
Erie Canal that water route which now
carries barges of only 240 tons will float
barges of 1,000 tons. The cost of carriage
per ton from Buffalo which is now 87
cents will be reduced on the enlarged
canal to 26 cents. In other words what
which now costs 34 cents per bushel for
carriage from Buffalo to the seaboard
will be carried for four fifths of a cent per
bushel. The great railway interests of
New York strenuously opposed the spend-
ing of 101 millions upon the Erie Canal,
but the people of the State have voted to
go forward with it. There will be no
possibility of the railways competing in
the carriage of grain, coal and ores with
the improved canal, if present expecta-
tions of the low cost of water carriage
shall be realized.
